State of Kentucky

Blair County Court January Term 1833

on this 7th day of January 1833 personally
appeared in open Court before the worthy
Justices of the County Court in and for the County
of Blair State of Kentucky now sitting
John Guider Sen. a resident of the County of
Blair of and State of Kentucky age 27 years
the 13th day of July 1832 who being first duly
sworn according to law doth on this Court
make the following declaration in
order to obtain the benefit of the
act of Congress passed June 20 1832
that he entered the service of the United
States of America in the County of Burke in
the State of North Carolina in the month
of March 1778 as a volunteer private man
under Capt Thomas Whitson
Lieutenant John Morgan doth not recall
the name of his Ensign however
immediately marched to Crossons Sta
tion on the frontier of North Carolina
where he remained there a short time when
he was marched against the Cherokee
Nation having learned some of the troops
he had marched but a few days he
was taken sick & returned with some
others back to the fort where he rem-
ained until he regained his health and
again assumed his duty as a soldier
his business being to guard the fort and
act as an Indian spy in which char-
acter he continued until his officers and com-
pany returned from the Cherokee Nation

and still continued there spring hunting and
guarding the fort until a few days after Chris-
mas when he was verbally discharged and
returned home having served over nine
months he states that early in March 1779
he again volunteered as an Indian Spie
under Capt Forgy and entered the service
of the United States immediately in that
character and was marched out to the
said Indian States when his bound
as a Spie was expressed to him by
his Capt and he faithfully discharged
the duties of spie until after
Christmas when he was again home
and was discharged by his Capt and
returned home having in the last
mentioned tour served more than
six months he again entered the
service as a volunteer in the character
of an Indian Spie under Capt
Daniel Smith sent from the
front of February 1780 and was march-
ed on to the Indian States and there continued
to discharge his duty as Spie and
guarding forts and other posts until
after Christmas when he was again
discharged making his actual service in
the of three years of upwards of two
years and four months he states that
he has taken no written discharge for

any of his services nor has he any docu-
mentary evidence of his service but he
can prove at least most of his services
by Valentine Greider Samuel Smith
and Rachel Smith of Cumberland County
Ky, who are all unable to attend this
Court but whose affidavits he has
procured & will cause the same to
be hereunto annexed he states that he
was born in the state of Maryland in the
year 1755 agreeable to the information
of his parents which he believes to be
true he was not registered of his birth
his father moved to Virginia when this
deponent was young and settled in
Caroline County from there he moved to
Caroline settled in Burke County there
his father died before the Revolution
this deponent remained in that County
till the year 1811 when he
moved to District of Adams County
where he now lives & has ever since
he hereby declares by every claim what
present and declares his income is not
on the Pension roll of the agency of any
State sworn to and subscribed the day

On this twenty second day of September
A. D. one thousand eight hundred and fifty
three, personally appeared before me, the undersigned,
a Justice of the Peace within and for the county
and State aforesaid, Isabel Grier, aged 93 years,
a resident of Henderson county, in the State
of Tennessee, who being first duly sworn
according to law, doth upon her oath declare,
that she is the widow of John Grier, who
was a soldier in the Revolutionary war, and
served in the State of North Carolina, for
which service he drew a pension, and
drew his pension at Lexington, in the
State of Kentucky, until he removed to the
county of Henderson, in the State of
Tennessee, and drew his money at Jackson,
in the State of Tennessee. She further
declares that her husband John Grier,
died in the county of Henderson, in the
State of Tennessee, on the 31st day of October
A. D. 1838, and that she has remained a
widow since his death and is still a
widow. She further declares that she
was married to her said husband in Burt,
county in the State of North Carolina,
in the year A. D. 1781, by one John Connally,
a Justice of the Peace, and that she has no
evidence of record of it. She further declares
that her name before her marriage to her
said husband was Isabel Blair. She
further declares that after the death
of her said husband John Grier, she
destroyed many of his old papers, and among

Other his pension papers.

She makes this declaration for the purpose of receiving the benefit of the act of Congress passed July 4th 1832, and for the purpose of being placed on the pension list, and to draw the arrearage of pension.

She further declares that her husband John Gridler, deceased, died in Henderson County in the State of Tennessee, in the year A. D. 1838, and that she has remained a widow since the death of said John Gridler, and is a widow now.

She further declares that she is the identical Isabel Gridler, who is now inscribed on the pension list at the rate of eighty dollars per annum, and made payable at the Agency in Jackson, in the State of Tennessee, and that her certificate is recorded in the Pension office on the roll of pensioners, under the act February 2nd, 1848, page 290, Vol. 3.

She makes this declaration for the purpose of obtaining the


county land to which she may be entitled
under the act approved March 3^d 1855.

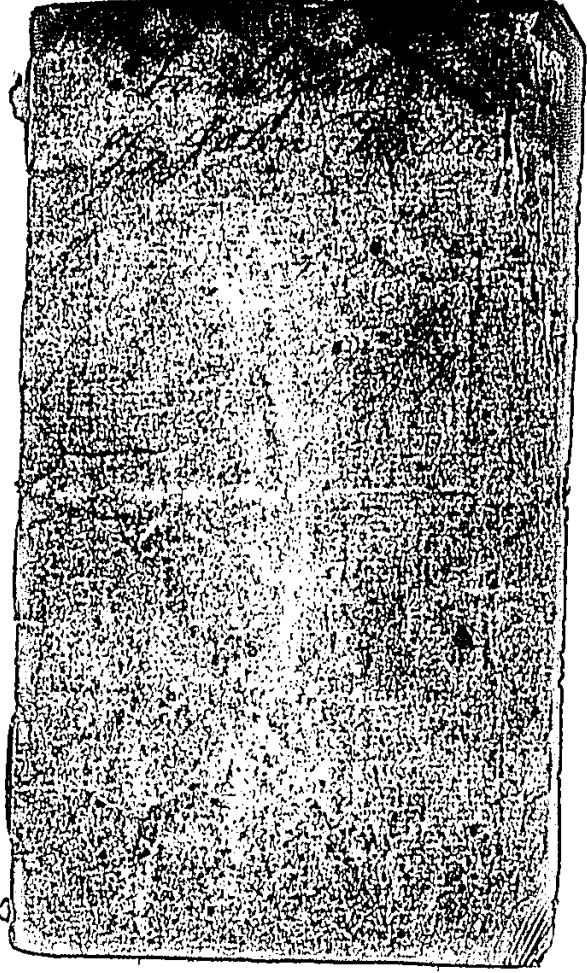
