Jeremiah Ingram's Declaration

State of Kentucky, Adams County, to wit
On this 7th day of August 1832 personally ap-
-peared before the Justice of the Peace County
Court Jeremiah Ingram a resident of the
County of Adams and State of Kentucky aged
73 years, who being first duly sworn ac-
-cording to law doth, on his oath make the
following declaration in order to obtain the
benefit of the provision made by the act of
Congress passed June 7th 1832. That he en-
-listed in the army of the United States in
the year 1776 with Bines Jones and served
in the 15th Virginia Regiment of the Virginia
line in Woodford Brigade under the following
named officers. He first marched under
Capt David Mazon to Petersburg from
thence to Colham on James River, crossed
& went to Williamsburg, from thence to
Dumfries there he took the small Post
from Dumfries to Alexandria, thence to
Georgetown, thence to Baltimore, thence
to Washington, from thence he boarded
Vessel & sailed to Philadelphia, and as
he sailed up the river the two forts Red
Bank on the right bank and Mud Is-
-land on the left. From Philadelphia
he marched and joined the army, from
thence to the 15th Virginia Regiment commanded

first by Capt David Mason, second by
Col Ennis, third by ^{1st} Abram Coliford
lastly by Col. Ruffell. When I joined the
15th Regiment I was commanded by
Capt Mason, then by Capt Gregory, and by
Capt White. The 16th Virginia Regiment was attached
to Genl Woodford's Brigade. Genl Woodford
and Maj. Dany's. When head quarters he
marched in pursuit of the enemy. he marched
through Philadelphia and through Darby.
He was stopped at Concord meeting house
where he remained until after the battle
of Brandywine. In the evening he was ordered
by Col. Ennis to fall in with my Company
we marched on to Philadelphia. from
thence he was ordered to Burlington. there
he remained on duty until the troops were
called to winter quarters at the Valley Forge
when the British left Philadelphia. we were in
pursuit of them. General orders from Genl. sent
to raise volunteers. He volunteered under him
He was then ordered to march to Monmouth Court
house. we met Genl. Lee on his retreat from the
battle ground. He marched on to the battle
ground at Monmouth and he was an eye
witness to the battle. from beginning to end
He was at Stony point the day after the battle
was fought also at Red Bank, and he was
in the State of New York at a place called
the white plains. He declares he served three
years & left the service in the year 1779 about
the 1st of December. He thinks he got his dis-
charge from Col. Wood ^{He sent his discharge to}
_{reclaimd Van's bay some time since}

He states that Philip Flaughter of Virginia
was for a short time in the 15th Regiment.

He hereby relinquishes every claim what-
-ever to a pension or an annuity, except the
present, and he declares that his name is
not on the pension roll of any agency in
any state, or (if any) only on that of the
agency in the State of Kentucky.

Sworn to and subscribed, the day & year
aforesaid.

opinion that the abovesaid applicant was
a revolutionary soldier and served as he
states.

My dear Mr. Johnson:

Reference is made to your letter in which you request the record of Jeremiah Ingram, a Revolutionary War pensioner of Kentucky, your request being in behalf of Immogene B. Brown, R. R. # 5, Box 181-B, Terre Haute, Indiana, whose letter you enclosed.

The record of Jeremiah Ingram follows as found in the papers of pension claim, S. 15186, based upon his service in the Revolutionary War.

The date and place of birth of Jeremiah Ingram and names of his parents are not shown.

Jeremiah Ingram enlisted in 1776, place not stated, served as private in Captains David Mason's, Gregory's and White's companies, Colonels David Mason's, Innis', Abraham Buford's and Russell's Virginia regiments, and was discharged about December 1, 1779, having served three years.

The soldier was allowed pension on his application executed August 9, 1833, at which time he was aged seventy-three years and a resident of Adair County, Kentucky.

No reference was made in the claim to wife or children.

In order to obtain the date of last payment of pension, the name and address of the person paid and possibly the date of death of Jeremiah Ingram, Immogene B. Brown should write to the Comptroller General, General Accounting Office, Records Division, this city,

and cite the following data: Jeremiah Ingram, certificate #7094,
issued February 23, 1833, rate \$30 per annum, commenced March 4,
1831, Act June 9, 1833, Kentucky Agency.

Imogene B. Brown's letter is returned herewith.
