State of Kentucky, Grant County Oct.

On this 6th day of February 1818 personally appeared in open Court, being a court of record, proceeding according to the course of the common law, for the said County, John Miller aged about sixty six years resident in said County, who being first duly sworn, according to law, doth on his oath declare that he served in the revolutionary war, as stated in his original declaration of the 5th of October 1818, and the additional declaration of the 14th of October 1819 hereto annexed, that I have received no pension from the government. I do solemnly swear, that I was a resident citizen of the United States on the 18th day of March 1818, and I have not since that time, by gift sale or in any other manner disposed of my property or any part thereof, with intent thereby to diminish it or to bring myself within the provisions of an act of Congress, entitled an act to provide for certain persons engaged in the land and naval service of the United States in the revolutionary war passed on the 18th day of March 1818. and that I have not nor has any person in trust for me any property or securities, contracts or debts due to me, nor have I any income other than what is contained in the schedule hereto annexed and by me subscribed

John Miller

One old negro woman Ephoras of 70 years of age, who is not worth twenty dollars, and has worth \$40 and no more, one son and sixp worth \$6 and no more, one cow and calf worth \$10 and no more, some other little articles of household furniture worth \$20 and no more, amounting in the whole to \$96.

His occupation is a tiller of the ground, he has no wife nor child living with him.

Dear Madam:

The data contained herein were obtained from the papers on file in the Revolutionary War claim for pension, S. 56136, based upon the military service in that war of John Miller.

The date and place of birth and the names of the parents of John Miller are not shown.

John Miller enlisted, place not stated, in 1778, served one year as sergeant in Captain Tarlton Payne's Company, Colonel Richard Parker's First Virginia Regiment and was in the battle of Monmouth and many skirmishes.

He was allowed pension on his application executed October 5, 1818, at which time he was aged about sixty-four years and a resident of Adair County, Kentucky.

In 1821 he stated he had no wife nor child living with him. There are no further family data.

About 1826 he moved from Adair County, Kentucky, to Russell County, Kentucky, where he lived seven years.

In order to obtain the date of last payment of pension, the name of person paid and possibly the death date of soldier, you should apply to the Comptroller General, General Accounting Office, Records Division, Washington, D. C., and cite the following data:
"John Miller, Certificate No. 18160, issued April 9, 1831, rate \$8.00 per month, commencing October 5, 1818, Act of March 18, 1818 and May 1, 1820, Kentucky Agency".
