day of September 1818. William Mosby  
aged about 66 years a citizen of said  
County Personally appeared before me  
Thomas Montgomery one of the Circuit Judges  
in and for the Commonwealth of ~~and~~  
Made Oath that about the year 1778 or 9  
he enlisted as a private Soldier in the  
Continental Establishment against the  
Common Enemy for three <sup>years</sup> or during the war  
under Capt Charles Flemming. Col<sup>d</sup> Davis's  
Regiment General Woodford's Division  
that he was in the Battle of Brandevine  
German town and Monmouth and several  
other skirmishes against the Common Enemy  
he further states that he faithfully and  
honestly discharged ~~the~~ served the full term  
for which he was enlisted and was honor-  
ably discharged at Winchester Virginia which  
discharge he has lost he further states  
that he is aged and infirm and unable  
to labour that he is in indigent  
Circumstances and stands in need of the  
aid of his Country for support and claims  
the same agreeably to an act of the  
Congress of the United States made and  
provided for the Relief of the Officers and  
Soldiers of the ~~Continental~~ <sup>Continental</sup> Establishment  
&c. At the same time John  
Biggs made that he is somewhat  
acquainted with the character

of William Mosby & has never heard  
 ought against his reputation & that he  
 believes he is a poor man. I do  
 certify my belief of the statement  
 of facts herein contained. Given

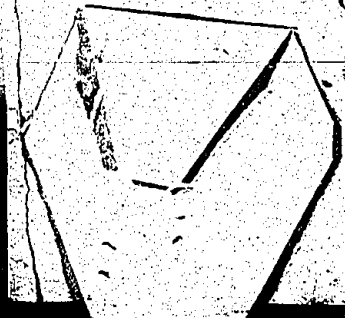

On this 7<sup>th</sup> day of November 18<sup>th</sup> personally appeared  
in open Court it being a Court of Record for the  
County of Adair aforesaid, by Statute and proceeding  
according to the course of the common law. William  
Mosby aged 40 years resident in the county aforesaid  
who being duly sworn according to law, doth on his  
oath declare that he served in the Revolutionary war  
as is stated in his application bearing date the 7<sup>th</sup>  
day of September 1818 and now in the office of the  
War Department of the United States, that he  
has a pension certificate (No. 409) upon which  
he has drawn his pension up to the 4<sup>th</sup> day of  
March 1820 and I do solemnly swear that I was  
a resident citizen of the United States on the 18<sup>th</sup>  
day of March 1818, and that I have not since that  
time by gift, sale or in any manner disposed  
of my property or any part thereof with intent  
thereby to diminish it as to bring myself within  
the provisions of an act of Congress entitled an  
act to provide for certain persons engaged in the land  
and naval service of the United States in the  
revolutionary war passed on the 18<sup>th</sup> day of March  
1818 and that I have not, nor has any person  
in trust for me any property or securities, contracts  
or debts due to me nor have I any income other than  
what is contained in the schedule hereto annexed  
and by me subscribed, viz. One horse worth \$20  
and no more, One mare worth \$25 and no more  
One cow and calf worth \$16 and no more  
head of Hogs worth \$10 and no more amount-  
ing in the whole to \$71-00

And the said William Masby further declares  
upon his oath that his age is 66 years, that his  
his occupation is a tiller of the ground & that in  
consequence of his age and bodily infirmities he is  
not able to pursue it so as to make a support, that  
his wife is named Rhanna 56 years of age & entirely  
infirm & unable to render him any assistance  
His son Jesse now lives with him and is able  
to labour who is also a tiller of the ground and  
is 20 years of age, and is not bound to remain  
with more than one year longer, his daughter  
Elizabeth also lives with him and is about 16  
years of age, her occupation is a spinster his daugh-  
ter Nancy also lives with him, and is of the same  
Occupation, and is 14 years of age; but the daughter  
cannot more than maintain themselves and  
wait on their helpless mother. These are all  
the children residing with this applicant.

period of During the war in the Company commanded by Capt  
Thos: Fulkerson of the Seventh Regiment of the Virginia  
line an Continental establishment and remained in said  
Service until the close of the said war when I was Discharged  
at Winchester in the State of Virginia being then  
in the Fifth Regiment of the Virginia line

I do further testify and declare that I have never received  
a warrant from the United States for the bounty land  
promised me by the United States neither have I ever  
sold or transferred my right to the same - Therefore

Know all men by these Presents that I William Mosley  
do hereby constitute and appoint John  
my true and lawful attorney for me  
and in my name and for my use to ask demand and  
receive from the Secretary of War of the United States a  
warrant for the bounty land due me and my said  
attorney is hereby authorized and empowered to constitute  
and appoint one or more substitutes or attorneys under  
him for the special purposes above named and the  
same to do or do as he shall think fit - In witness whereof I have

set my hand and seal this sixth of February 1834

On this the 18<sup>th</sup> day of August 1843 personally appeared before me John H Taylor an acting Justice of the Peace in & for the County and State aforesaid said Mrs. Dianina Mosbey a resident of said County - aged 78 years and who after being first duly sworn according to Law doth and her oath make the following Declaration in order to obtain the benefit of the proviso made by the act of Congress passed the 11<sup>th</sup> July 1838 Entitled an act granting half pay and Pensions to certain Widows to wit. That she is the widow of William Mosbey who was a Soldier in the war of the Revolution & she states belonged to the Virginia State Line, Was a Soldier to the end of the war and who on account of his services as said Soldier in said war & in said Line received a Pension of \$76. It appeared and to the evidence & supporting the matters of the application of her said husband for said Pension she refers for such particulars and well as any investigation of her claims. She further declares that she has no documentary evidence in support of her claim. She further declares that she was married to the said William Mosbey on the 5<sup>th</sup> day of October Seventeen hundred and Eighty Six and that her said husband William Mosbey died on the 15<sup>th</sup> day of July Eighteen hundred & forty three that she was not married to the said Mr. Mosbey prior to his leaving the service but <sup>the</sup> marriage took place prior to the first day of January 1794 which was at the time above stated & that she has never since the death of her said
