Declaration in Order to obtain the Benefit
of the Act of Congress passed June
7th 1832 -

~~State of Kentucky to~~
~~Camp Covington~~

In this 20th Day of August 1832 personally
appeared in open Court before the
Honorable John S. Bridges Judge of the Circuit
Court and Clerk sitting, John Cannady,
a Resident of County & State of Kentucky,
aged Sixty five Years who being first duly
Sworn according to Law doth on his oath
make the following Declaration in Order
to obtain the Benefit of the Act of
Congress passed June 7th 1832 -

That he entered the Service of the United
States under the following named Officer
and served as herein stated, until the
first of September 1814 he and Capt
Charles Callaway's Company of Artillery who
belonged to Colo Callaway's Regiment
of Virginia Artillery, was in the State of
State of Virginia, who marched through
Prince Edward County through Petersburg
being crossing James River at Lums
Point then on through Lums Town
Williamsburg & on to General Washington
town Head quarters, at York Town
Virginia, was then transferred from Colo
Callaway to Colo ~~John~~ Taylor's Regiment
in General Savoies Brigade -

~~and~~ during serving the League at York
town was at the ~~service~~ ~~service~~ of General Lee
while Army at Yorktown & then was
~~discharged~~ from the services & returned home
making a tour of over three months
of while at Yorktown certain Stephen
Jones enlisted in the continental Troop of
horses commanded by Capt Washington
for three years & served seven or eight
months in said Troop & then deserted the
service of the United States & returned to
Bedford County Virginia, my residence and
then prevailed on me to take his place
which I did as a substitute for said Jones
upon a new enlistment, which was for
serving ~~the~~ ^{one} year being the punishment
put on Jones for his desertion he being
return'd as a deserter, was compelled to leave
the whole war thus ~~desertion~~ ^{one} year was
about the first of July 1782 at Cumm
berland Old Courthouse Virginia being the
place where the Regiments to which other
of Pennsylvania, the Regiments to which other
belonged was commanded by Capt Greenback
or, belonging to Captain Patrick's Company
in said Regiment, served at that place
until about October following, there was
transferred to Capt's members of Capt Beale's
Troop whom as ^{on} their arrival to the South
to join Capt Washington's Regiment of
horses at a then taken sick & not being
able to March was then ^{placed} by
them to return home and
remain there until I recovered my health

then was to return & doin any thing going
to the South or where ever Gen Washington
thought of his wife be found. Accordingly
in March following I left him on the
front of said Regiment & Marched to New
London Campville County & was then
Staged by Capt Clark the Commandant
of the Garrison at that place & was left
him returned; as an ~~invalid~~^{invalid}, to do Garrison
duty, & continued at that place, until six
Christmas following, then was honorably
discharged as a soldier for the War by the
Fair Capt Clark of the Continental Line &
Commandant of said Garrison.)

I hereby relinquish every claim whatever to
a pension or an Annuity Except the sum
and be believed that his name is not on the
Pension Roll of any agency in any State
Name to and Subscribed the day and year
aforesaid

Sworn Declaration of John Cannaday
State of Kentucky, vs.
Cany County, 1st Oct

I personally appeared before me the undersigned
a Justice of the Peace for the County aforesaid
John Cannaday, who being duly sworn depos-
eth and saith that by Reason of old age
and the consequent loss of memory he cannot
swear positively as to the exact length of
his service, but according to the best of his
Recollection he served first less than the
periods mentioned below and in the following
grades, for the year 1781 I served as a
Sutorman for Samuel Glazier a draft
coloraman of Bedford County Virginia three
months as before stated & for the year
1782 I served as a Regular Soldier as above
stated six months, and for the year 1783
I served twelve months as a Regular
Soldier as before stated making in all
one year & nine months and for such
service I claim a pension if will and
the several Intergagers presented by the War
Department (first Interagator) named
Barn in King George County Virginia in
the year 1763 March 14th second Interagager
named, I have no record of my age
third Interagator, named John Peery
& wife Coffey Susan & submitted the date
above — — — — — John Cannaday

If the said John Peery states the character
for veracity of the above named John Cannaday
is good & believe that he did serve as a Regu-
lar Soldier as he states for he was his mas-
sate in the service & believes he did serve
as he states in the militia sworn to & served
the date above John Peery
& wife Coffey Certify the Character

Be it known that before me John M' Cowen a Justice
of the peace in and for the County aforesaid personally
appeared Robert Kenaday Esq. known to me to be a person
of good repute, and a credible witness and being duly
sworn deposes and says, that he is the son of John and
Mary Kenaday, that his Father was a pensioner of
the United States at the rate of \$36.66 per annum
and that he died on the 15th day of December 1836. That his
name was inscribed on the pension Roll, John Cannaday
that to his knowledge, the same family connections
spelled their names differently - some with C and
others with K - that his Father was not a scribe
sufficient to write his own name. Though he all
may say that the proper spelling of his name was
with K - This deponent further states that
the register of births, hereto attached by reference, is
the correct register of the births of his parents children
is in the handwriting of John Kenaday his older Brother
and was written more than thirty years ago, and has
been in possession of the family ever since that time
This deponent was born September 24th 1791 - John. The
person who wrote this register is not living
Sworn to and subscribed this 2nd day of December 1844

Dear Sir:

The data which follow were obtained from papers on file in pension claim, R.1654, based upon service in the Revolutionary War of John Cannaday. The surname is also shown as Kornady, Canaday, and Kanaday.

John Cannaday was born March 14, 1763, in King George County, Virginia. The names of his parents are not shown.

While a resident of Bedford County, Virginia, John Cannaday enlisted about September 1, 1781, served as private about three months in Captain Charles Callaway's company, Colonel Callaway's Virginia regiment, and was at the seige of Yorktown; enlisted at Cumberland Court House, Virginia July 1, 1782, served in Captain Kirkpatrick's company, Colonel Fobiger's Virginia regiment, until October 1782, after which he served in Captains Yarborough's and Dade's companies, enroute to join Colonel Washington's regiment of horse, became ill and received a furlough to return home; he remained at home until March 1783, when he went to rejoin Colonel Washington's regiment, marched to New London, Campbell County, (Virginia), where Captain Irish was commandant of the garrison at that place and where said captain detailed him as an invalid to do garrison duty, which duty he performed until about Christmas, (1783) when he was honorably discharged.

The soldier was allowed pension on his application executed August 20, 1832, at which time he was residing in Casey County, Kentucky. In 1836 he was living in Montgomery County, Illinois. He died December 15, 1836.

John Cannaday married March 26, 1787, in Campbell County, Virginia, Mary Shearer. At the time of their marriage they were both living in Campbell County, Virginia. Names of her parents and date and place of her birth are not shown.

In 1844, soldier's widow, Mary Cannaday, was aged eighty-three years and a resident of Montgomery County, Illinois.

The names of their children are shown as follow:

In 1836, one John Cannaday, and one William I. Cannaday were residing in Montgomery County, Illinois and stated they had known the soldier about twenty and about fifteen years respectively, their relationship not stated.

In 1844, Robert Cannaday (as he signed), son of John and Mary Cannaday was living in Montgomery County, Illinois.
