Dorcas Nuttall
widow of Jacob Nuttall, dec'd.
who was a pensioner under the Act of
1800 who died on the 11 August 1800

Be it known that on this 21st day of May 1839 personally appeared before John Chittom a Justice of the Peace in and for Henry County Ky and one of the Justices of the Henry County Court Doreas Antill a resident of said County aged twenty six years and upwards who being duly sworn according to law upon her oath made the following declaration in order to obtain the benefit of the act of Congress passed on the 7th day of July 1838

This declarant states that she is a resident of Henry County Ky. and has been for a number of years past - that she was 76 years of age on the 30th day of September last - that she is the widow of Jacob Antill deceased who died on or about the 11th day of August in the year 1800 as well as she now remembers and that she has not been married since his death but still remains his widow.

She states that she was married to the said Jacob Antill in Barclay County Virginia on or about the 20th day of February in the year 1781 - that her maiden name was Doreas Dawson.

She further states that previous to her said marriage the said Jacob Antill her said husband as she was informed and believing enlisted into the service of the United States as a regular Soldier and did enter the service as such and did continue in the service for some three or four years and was taken as a prisoner of War by the British at or near Charleston - this she understood

before her said Marriage and also understood that he had fortunately made his escape from them and since her said Marriage she has often heard her said husband speak of the same matter and make the same statements - She also states that it has been her understanding that when he was mustered into the service he entered into the Company Commanded by one Capt. Geo. Rice - I recollect to have heard him often say that he was in the Battles of Brandywine and Germantown and some others -

This declarant says that she has lost the Family records and has now to rely upon her memory for the dates above named as stated by the ages of her Children -

And I the said John Chittow Justice of the Peace and member of the County Court do hereby certify that the foregoing declaration of Dorcas Antill was this day by her made in person before me and sworn to and subscribed in my presence. And I certify that I am well acquainted with the said ~~Elizabeth~~ Dorcas Antill that she is the widow of Jacob Antill dec^d and has not married since his death that she appears to be of the age represented by her and is a resident of Henry County Ky and is a credible person and her statements are entitled to Credit and that she is very infirm in body from age & sickness and is unable to attend court

The deposition of Elizabeth Bishop of Henry County Ky. taken on the 24th May 1839 who being duly sworn according to law deposes and says that she is now about 75 years of age and lives in Henry County Ky. that during the Revolutionary War her father whose name was William Eldie lived in Barclay County Va. and that John Dawkins the father of Dorcas Dawkins (at present Dorcas Antill) lived near to him; and in the early part of the year she thinks in the month of February 1781 the said Dorcas Dawkins was married to Gessie Antill - this deponent was at the wedding and knows the fact to be that they were so married & she has known them well ever since their marriage and been intimately acquainted with them -

She further states that said Gessie Antill died sometime in the year 1800 as well as she remembers and that the said Dorcas his said wife remains his widow and has not married since his death. She further states that she has always understood that the said Gessie Antill was a revolutionary soldier and never heard the fact disputed - and that his widow the said Dorcas resides in Henry County Ky. and is a respectable & credible person

Also the deposition of Elisha Bishop taken on the 24th day of May 1839 who being duly sworn according to law deposes and says that he is a resident of Henry County Ky. and is now upwards of 81 years of age and that he is on the Pension Roll of the United States as a soldier

of the revolution - he states and avows that he was well acquainted with Jacob Antille in the time of the Revolutionary War and he avows that he served as a regular soldier for at least two years and perhaps a good deal more - this deponent says that he saw him frequently in the service and he now labours under the impression that he the said Antille at one time was in the Company of one Morgan Alexander and attached to the 1st Regiment of Continental troops from Virginia - he further states that said Antille lived at the time of his enlistment in the County of Barclay & State of Virginia and that after he left the service and in the year 1781 perhaps February of that year he the said Antille was married to Dorcas Dawkins (in the same County & State) daughter of John Dawkins who lived in the same neighborhood in which this deponent lived - This deponent does not remember certainly whether he was at the making & witnessing the ceremony but presumes that he was because the making of it is vividly impressed upon his mind & he has known them & they have been all the while since known as man & wife and he has been upon the most intimate terms with them - He says that about the year 1800 the said Jacob Antille died leaving his said wife Dorcas his widow who still survives and who has not married since his death and who resides in Henry County Ky -

Also the deposition of Mary Dawkins taken at the same time & place who being duly sworn deposes and says that she is now about 69 years of age and is a native of Barclay County Virginia - that she resided there with her father during the war of the revolution - that she was well acquainted with the family of John Dawkins who lived in the same neighbourhood with her father's family & that one Jacob Nuttle with whom she was also well acquainted married Dorcas Dawkins daughter of the said John Dawkins in the year 1781 or thereabouts and she thinks it was in the month of February of that year - this deponent says that she was then only about 10 or 11 years old at the time of the said marriage and afterwards married one of the brothers of the said Dorcas and has of course been well acquainted with the whole family from that period - she states that she was present at the marriage of the said Jacob Nuttle and the said Dorcas Dawkins and was an eye witness to the ceremony, that she is not mistaken about it, that the said Nuttle had but a short time before returned from the army in which he had been for a long time as a regular soldier - deponent did not see him enlist, but verily believes he did do so and that he did serve - she states that about the year 1800 he the said Jacob Nuttle died leaving his said wife the said Dorcas his widow who still survives and lives in Henry County Ky. and has not married since his death.

Madam:

I advise you from the papers in the Revolutionary War pension claim, W. 8328, it appears that Jacob Antill, while residing in Berkeley County, Virginia, served three or four years as a private in Captains George Rice's and Morgan Alexander's Virginia Companies, was in the battles of Brandywine, Germantown, and was taken prisoner at Charleston, but made his escape, no specific dates as to his service.

He died August 11, 1800.

He married February 20, 1781 in Berkeley County, Virginia, Dorcas Dawkins, daughter of John Dawkins of Berkeley County, Virginia. She was born September 30, 1763.

She was allowed pension on her application executed May 21, 1839, while a resident of Henry County, Kentucky.

Children are referred to, only name stated being John, who was living in Henry County, Kentucky in 1853, and stated that his mother "died in this county many years since".
