Warren County in the state of Pennsylvania
In the sixth Judicial District

On the 22nd day of June in the year of our Lord one thousand eight hundred and twenty, before me, the undersigned one of the Judges of the Court of Common Pleas for the County of Warren, in the said district, personally came Jacob Bechtel of sixty five years, a resident in the said county of Warren, in the said sixth Judicial District, who being first duly sworn according to law, doth on his oath make the following declaration in order to obtain the provisions of the late act of Congress entitled, "An act to provide for certain persons engaged in the land and naval services of the United States in the Revolutionary War." That he, the said Jacob Bechtel, enlisted under Lieutenant William Whitman, Captain George Grant, company, Colonel George Nagle's Regiment, being the ninth regiment of the Pennsylvania Line, in the Continental Establishment, about in the spring of 1777, and served for and during the space of seven years, was in the battles of Brandywine and Red Bank and was severely wounded and taken prisoner at Mifflin's Fort, That he is in reduced circumstances and stands in need of the assistance of his country for support that he has no other evidence of his services than what is here with him.

And you then he doth solemnly swear that he was a resident citizen of the United States on the eighteenth day of March one thousand eight hundred and eighteen, and that he has not, since that time, by gift, sale, or in any manner whatsoever, disposed of his property or any part thereof, with intent thereby to diminish it as to bring himself within the provisions of an act of Congress, entitled "An act to provide for certain persons engaged in the land and naval services of the United States

in the Revolutionary War," paid on the eighteenth day
of March one thousand eight hundred and eighteen,
and that he has not, nor has any person in trust for
him, any property, or securities, contracts, or debts due
to him; and that he has no income, other than what is con-
tained in the schedule hereto annexed and by him sub-
scribed.

did serve in the Revolutionary War, as stated in his preceding de-

Jacob Bettle is in such circumstances, and stands in need of the
assistance of his country, for support especially to the Act of Congress,
before mentioned — And now transmit the proceedings and docu-
ments and heretofore, to the Secretary of the Department of
War, pursuant to the directions of the aforesaid Act of Congress

In the Sixth Judicial District,

On this seventh day of September 1820, personally appeared in open court of Common Pleas, Jacob Bestam, aged ~~with~~ ^{thirty} years, who being first duly sworn according to law, doth, on his oath, make the following declaration in order to obtain the provision made by the acts of Congress of the 18th March 1798, and the 1st May 1820, that he has said Jacob Bestam enlisted for the term of three years or during the pendency of the War, on the 17th day of March 1777, in the State of Pennsylvania, in the company commanded by Captain George Grant, in the Regiment commanded by Colonel George Nagle, in the line of Pennsylvania, on the continental establishment; that he continued to serve in the said corps until the same was discharged, when he was honorably discharged from the said service in the year 1783, in the State of Pennsylvania - That he was taken Prisoner at the Fort of Mifflin, after having been severely wounded in the head, hand and back - That he was in the battles of Brandy wine, Germantown and Monmouth, and several others - And that he has no other evidence of his services than now in his power than what is here with me.

And in pursuance of the act of the 1st May 1820 I do solemnly swear that I was a resident citizen of the United States on the 18th day of March one thousand eight hundred and eighteen; and that I have not since that time, by gift, sale, or in any manner disposed of my property, in any part thereof, with intent thereby, so to diminish, it as to bring myself within the provisions of an act of Congress, entitled "An act to provide for certain persons engaged in the land and naval service of the United States during the revolutionary war," passed on the 18th day of March one thousand eight hundred and eighteen; and that I have not nor has any person in trust for me, any person in trust for me, any property or securities, contracts or debts due to me, nor have I any income whatever and for this I do hereby relinquish all claim to any portion hereof from the United States or elsewhere.
