State of Kentucky, Henry July 3 1862

on the 14th day of Nov 1862 personally appeared before me
Pierc Muttall a Justice of the Peace in and for Henry County
Spade Collett aged 73 years who just being duly sworn
according to Law with on his oath make the following
declaration in order to obtain the benefit of an act
of Congress passed the 7th of June 1862

He deposes that he entered the service of the United States
under the following named Officer and badge of rank
stated by that in the month of April 1861 he was
entered the service as a drafted Militia and was
commanded by Capt William P. [unclear] of Hampshire
County Virginia for a term of three months he states that
he went with the balance of Capt [unclear] Company
quartered at Marshallburg in said County of Berkeley
and after remaining there a short time that Col. Richard
Lindell's Regiment to which he was attached was or-
dered to march to Frederickburg on the Rappahannock
River in Spotsylvania County for the purpose
of arresting Cornwallis' progress in the country
he states that about the first of May that Col. Lindell's
Regiment reached Frederickburg where they remained
for a few days waiting for a supply of arms
ammunition &c on arriving at Frederickburg he
states that the Militia from Hampshire County
commanded by Col. Higgins were there stationed
waiting for arms and ammunition after some
consultation between the Officers it was ordered

by the commanding officers that such soldiers as
had arms should form a company and march
in haste to Richmond he further states that out
of the militia from the counties of Hampshire
and Berkeley a company was formed and he
having taken the wife from home with him was
put in that company ~~the~~ the company thus
formed was officered by Michael Stump Capt, Thomas
Hart, Lieutenant, and Matthias Casper. He states that
they were then ordered to march to Richmond which
they did and joined the main army commanded by
General Lafayette after uniting with General
Lafayette's army about midway Capt Stump's Company
was ordered to march to a place called the
Grounds near Bridge to unite with Capt John
Blough's company of Cavalry about this time
the British army commanded by Cornwallis compe-
-led us to retreat ~~for~~ the reason that they were ordered
up into ^{the} country into the county of Albemarle as well
as the now uninhabited where they were stationed for
a short time thence to a place called the Racoon
Ford on the South branch of the Rappahannock
the British failing to come as was expected this
high in the country Capt Stump's Company and

Capt Hugh's company of Cavalry were then ordered to
March to Richmond and as they marched to
Richmond they fell in with General Wayne's army
that had united with General Lafayette about two
days march above Richmond the whole army
under the command of General Lafayette was
then ordered and marched to New Kent
within a few miles of the British army the
time of this account after being out the state that
was discharged in writing by his said Capt Mich-
-all Stump in the absence of his colon (Richard Wells)
This account states that upon receiving his discharge
that Capt Stump proposed to his Men to volunteer
for an other tour ^{of three months} as General Lafayette's army had
been reinforced by General Wayne there was
then a prospect of being able to withdraw and
Cornwallis' army and to prevent his making
incursions into the country he states that after ~~some~~
~~being~~ from the and nearly all of Capt Stump's
company volunteered for an other tour of three
months and that after remaining some time
in New Kent that Cornwallis directed his
course towards Little York to which place the
army under the command of Lafayette marched
and was then stationed till his second tour expired
when they under the command of Capt Stump
were discharged he states that he has no

documentary evidence of his service and that he knows of
no living witness by whom he can find said service he
also states that from old age and being severely
stricken with the palsy that he is unable to appear
in person to make his declaration the Clerk
will inquire into my claim whatever for a pension or
annuity except the present and declares that
his name is not on the pension roll of the govern-
ment of the State

two written discharges given by my brother Michael ~~Stamps~~
which discharges I have lost many years since these
discharges were given ⁱⁿ the absence of my brother (Richard
Wells). Q. State the names of some of the regular offi-
cers who were with the troops where you served and
such circumstances and military regiments as you
can recollect? Ans. Major McPherson and Capt.
Ogden ~~Anderson~~ ^{was all} ~~Surgeon~~ ^{Surgeon} were with us
at some of our ~~operations~~ ^{operations} near Richmond & were
before us after was some in Col. Heggins regiment
of Militia was with us a part of the time and whether
his regiment was discharged or sent to any
other place, I am not able to say at this time

We John Field and Anthony Lindsay of residing in the
neighborhood of Isaac Collett who has subscribed
and sworn to the above accusation say that we are
well acquainted with him and that we believe
him to be 73 years of age that he is reputed and
believed to be a man of veracity in his neighbor-
hood and was a soldier of the revolution and died
as he states in his accusation and that we concur
in the opinion

Madam:

I have to advise you, that from the papers in the Revolutionary War pension claim, S-30964, it appears that Isaac Collett was born in Baltimore County, Maryland in 1760.

While residing in Berkley County, Virginia he enlisted in April 1781 as a private in Captain William Vestal's Company, Colonel Richard Willis' Virginia Regiment and was soon after transferred to Captain Michael Stump's Virginia Company and served six months in all.

He was allowed pension on his application executed November 14, 1833 while residing in Henry County, Kentucky. In 1836 he had one son and three daughters. Their names and that of his wife are not ~~on record.~~ *stated*
