Sir:

The evidence in support of your claim, under the act of June 7, 1832, has been examined, and the papers are herewith returned. The following is a statement of your case in a tabular form. On comparing these papers with the following rules and the subjoined notes you will readily perceive that objections exist, which must be removed, before a pension can be allowed. The notes and the regulations will show what is necessary to be done. Those points to which your attention is more particularly directed, you will find marked in the margins with a brace, (thus: }). You will, when you return your papers to this Department, send this printed letter with them; and you will, by complying with this request, greatly facilitate the investigation of your claim.

On this 3^d day of December 1832 personally
appeared in open court (now sitting) before the Justice
of the county court for the county of Henry and
State of Kentucky aforesaid - Alexander Deacon -
a resident of Henry county and state of Kentucky of
aged seventy one years on the 5th day of January
last past who being first duly sworn according to
Law, doth in his oath make the following declaration
in order to obtain the benefit of the provision made
by the act of Congress, passed 7th June 1832.

That he entered in the army of the united
states in the year 1778 that he was enlisted by Charles
Smith - a sergeant - and served - (as he now thinks) in
the 4th Regiment of the Pennsylvania Line - under
the following named officers - to wit - Captain Crites
& part of the time under Capt. Pelegue - the Regiment
when he joined the army was commanded by Col.
Woods - that he enlisted for & during the war - and
was a private soldier - that he served during the
war, after he enlisted, and was discharged in
1783 - when the army was disbanded - by Col -
Hobbs, he was discharged in the state of Massachusetts in
Roxbury.

that he resided in the county of North Hampton
Pennsylvania, when he enlisted - that since the war
- any he has resided in Kentucky & for 55 years he
has lived in Kentucky in Henry county where he now
lives - that he joined the army near Princeton in
New Jersey from there he went to the white plains -
thence up the river & camped at Kings ferry - Gen. Wayne
& Washington was there - Wayne commanded the
Pennsylvania Line - he lived at the ferry sometime
& remained in the neighborhood for some

time - This was in the state of New York - The
Army was frequently at Stony Point in the state
of New York - That he was also at Red Bank
That he remained in New York & New Jersey with
the Army - until We marched to Bellefleur
& took Comoraller in Virginia - That he was
there - After this 1781. he marched back to Red
Bank in New York - afterwards to Rhode Island
& to Providence in Massachusetts, where he was
discharged.

He hereby relinquishes every claim, whatever to a
pension or annuity except the present and
he declares that his name is not on the Pension
Roll of the Agency of any State -

The affidavit of Katharine Dumm taken on the 9th day of Octo-
 1833 at her own house in Henry County Kentucky - This affidavit being
 first duly sworn according to law, doth on her oath state that she
 is the widow and relict of Alexander Dumm deceased who after
 this life in Henry County Ky. on the 19th day of April 1833 and
 he was the same Alexander Dumm who deposited the before made
 his declaration before the Henry County Court on the 8th day of
 1832 in order to obtain the benefit of the act of Congress passed
 June 7th 1832 - She states that she has often heard her said hus-
 -band in his lifetime speak of his services in the revolutionary
 war and she has no doubt but that he did serve in that war
 for a long time and faithfully - She states that she is quite
 poor and stands much in need of the pay which may be
 due her said husband on account of his said services and
 she asks the government to give the case a favourable consider-
 -ation - She claims all that may be due on said account and
 asks respectfully for her interest in the premises to be fully consider-
 -ed and respected - She states that she resides in Henry County
 Kentucky -

The deposition of Margaret Vanhorne taken on the 9th day
of Oct. 1833 at the house of Daniel Vanhorne in Stuy County
Kentucky to be used on the part of Alexander Deum who may
an applicant to be placed on the pension roll of the United
States as a soldier of the Revolution. - This deponent being of
lawful age and duly sworn according to law states that she is
the sister of the said Alexander Deum who made his declara-
tion before the Stuy County Court on the 3^d day of Decr 1832
in order to obtain the benefit of the act of Congress passed June
7th 1832. - She states that during the revolutionary war she
resided with her father in Northampton County Pennsylvania
- that she was about 4 years older than her brother the said
Alexander Deum - that she well remembers that her said
Brother after the war had commenced sometime she thinks
sometime in the year 1778, enlisted into the Army of the United
States and left home and went into the Army under his enlist-
ment. - She recollects also distinctly to have understood from
him (her said Brother) and her father and the balance of the
relations and friends that her said Brother enlisted for and
during the war - this she understood at the time he went from
home to join the Army and she has also ever since then
understood the same thing from him and the family - This
deponent also further states that she distinctly remembers when
her said Brother returned home and she also remembers that
he brought with him his discharge and that her father who
was a noted patriot applauded his brother much for his
conduct. - She also states that she is certain that her brother
did not return till long after peace was made and she
thinks that his return was in the fall of the year 1783 and
she understood that he was discharged at Roxbury in Mas-
sachusetts. - She is persuaded that he did not serve less than
five years. - She states that the said Alex^r Deum died on the 19th Sept^r
