Be it shown that on this 9<sup>th</sup> day of October 1833 Person  
born William McBrackin a Justice of the Peace for Henry County and one of the Justices  
of the Henry County Court ~~and one of the Justices of the Peace for Henry County~~  
Amos Biele a resident of the said County of  
Henry Kentucky, aged 69 years who being first duly sworn according  
to law upon his oath makes the following declaration in order to  
obtain the benefit of the act of Congress passed March 7<sup>th</sup> 1832

That he entered the service of the United States under the fol-  
-lowing named officers and served as herein stated that is to say  
being a resident of Culpepper county in the state of Virginia he did  
on or about the 1<sup>st</sup> day of April 1781 as well as he at present re-  
-members enter the service of the United States as a substitute for  
a certain James Arnold upon a tour of three months in the com-  
-pany of Captain Fisher Rice - that the said J<sup>r</sup>. Arnold  
was drafted upon a tour of three months to serve as a private in  
the said company and that he this declarant agreed to serve the  
said tour as such in his stead and did actually and faithfully  
serve out the same accordingly - He states that he rendezvoused  
with his company at the Court house in Culpepper County Virginia  
and was then attached to a regiment commanded by Colo. James  
Haughton - He thinks the Major named was Henry Hill - He also  
further states that Col. Muhlenberg had the Command of the Reg-  
-iment to which he was attached - that he was marched from  
his said place of Rendezvous to Petersburg in Virginia and there  
he was engaged in a skirmish with the British who he believ-  
-es were under the Command of Arnold the traitor - that the ~~same~~  
tobacco and public property at that place was burnt by them  
and that much additional injury was done - that he was  
at Richmond & Manchester and various other places during this  
tour and that he was also a part of the tour under La Fayette  
and at the termination of his said tour of service he was dis-  
-charged - and immediately thereupon to wit: in the month of  
July about the first of that month 1781 he again entered the service of  
the United States as a substitute for one Humphrey Arnold  
upon a tour of three months in the company of Captain Gordon  
and was attached to the regiment of Colo. John Haughton and  
that he did serve out said tour as a private militia soldier in

the place and stead of the said Humphrey Arnold who had been drafted upon said tour of three months. He states and declares that he continued in the service under his said officer as a substitute as abovenamed aiding and assisting in protecting the country from the depredations of the British. He states that much injury was done the private property of the country as well as the public. that his services were principally upon James River and in the country between James & North Rivers. He states also that he was a part of the time under the control and direction of the Marquis La Fayette - that he continued in the service until the expiration of his tour and was discharged at the termination thereof about the first of October 1781 and he returned home -

He states and declares that from the great lapse of time and his consequent loss of memory he cannot state with certainty and precision the minute circumstances of his service: but from his present best recollection he did not serve less than six months as a private soldier in the Army of the Revolution and for that service he claims a pension.

He states that he has no documentary evidence and that he knows of no person whose testimony he can procure who can testify to his service.

He hereby relinquishes every claim whatever to a pension or annuity except the present and declares that his name is not on the pension Roll of the agency of any State.

1<sup>st</sup>. Where and in what year were you born?

Answer - I was born in Culpeper County Va. in the year 1764

2<sup>d</sup>. Have you any record of your age and if so where is it?

Answer - I have a record of my age in my Bible at home

3<sup>d</sup>. Where were you living when called into service, where have you lived since the Revolutionary War, and where do you now live?

Answer - I lived in Culpeper County Va. which was called into service and then continued to live till 1808 and then moved to Clark County Ky. where I continued till about six years ago when I moved to Ruffin County Ky. where I now live -

1<sup>st</sup> How were you called into service; were you drafted, did you volunteer or were you a substitute and if a substitute for whom  
Answer Upon my first time I was a substitute for Sgt. Arnold and upon my second I was a substitute for Humphry Arnold - these were all the times I performed

2<sup>nd</sup> State the names of some of the regular officers who were with the troops where you were, such as Captains and militia regiments as you can recollect and the general circumstances of your service.

Answer It has been so long that I cant tell whether I can distinguish between the regular officers and militia. I recollect Sgt. Steuber, La Fayette, Washington, Wayne and Muehlberg and Col. Miller, Crane, James Slaughter and John Slaughter. My services were principally upon James River and in the County between York & James River. I was engaged in a skirmish at Petersburg Va. with the British Army under Arnold the traitor

3<sup>rd</sup> Did you ever receive a discharge from the service and if so by whom was it given and what has become of it.

Answer I rec<sup>d</sup> discharge which I have lost

4<sup>th</sup> State the names of persons to whom you are known in your present neighbourhood and who can testify as to your character for veracity and their belief of your service as a soldier of the revolution

Answer I will name Alexander Dunn and James Skille

We Alexander Dunn and James Skille residing in Spring town hereby certify that we are well acquainted with Samuel Skille who has subscribed and sworn to the above declaration that we believe him to be 69 years of age and that he is reputed and believed in the neighbourhood where he resides to have been a soldier of the revolution and that we concur in that opinion. We further certify that he is so informed in body that he cannot attend Court - Sworn to & subscribed the day and year aforesaid.

Dear Madam:

Reference is made to your letter in which you request the record of Samuel Hise (Hisco-Hiso), who received a pension while residing in Henry County, Kentucky.

A search of the Revolutionary War records has been made in your behalf and no record found of a claim for pension or bounty land having been made to the United States based upon the services of a soldier named Samuel Hise-Hisco-Hiso, of Henry County, Kentucky. The record of one Samuel Hise has been found of Henry County, Kentucky, who, perhaps, is the pensioner in whom you are interested.

Samuel Hise was born in 1764, in Culpeper County, Virginia.

While residing in Culpeper County, Virginia, he enlisted April 1, 1781, served three months as a private in Captain Fisher Hise's Company, Colonel James Slaughter's Virginia Regiment and was in the battle of Jamesstown; he enlisted about July 1, 1781, and served three months as a private in Captain Gordon's Company, Colonel John Slaughter's Virginia Regiment.

After the Revolution, he resided in Culpeper County, Virginia, until 1804, then moved to Clark County, Kentucky, where he resided until about 1827, then moved to Henry County, Kentucky.

He was allowed pension on his application presented October 9, 1833, while residing in Henry County, Kentucky.

There are no data as to soldier's family. In 1833, the name James Hise appears: no relationship shown.
