On this 7th day of October 1833 personally appeared in open Court before the Auditor of the Murray County Robert Howland Charles Hageley a resident of Murray County Kentucky aged 40 years who being first duly sworn according to law doth on his oath make the following declaration in order to obtain the benefit of the Act of Congress passed March 7th 1832

That he entered the service of the United States under the following named officers and served as herein stated that is to say being a resident of Loudoun County in the State of Virginia he did in the Month of February in the year 1781 enter the service of the United States as a private soldier and drafted Militia Man upon a tour of three months in the Company of Capt. Thomas Blumphy - that he rendezvoused with his Company at the Red House in Loudoun County Va. and was attached to the Regiment of Col. Co. D and came under the Command of Gen. Heade - that he was marched from his said place of Rendezvous to Williamsburg Va. and from thence to York and from thence again to Williamsburg and soon after was stationed for a while at Revella ferry and was then again marched to Williamsburg and from thence to Richmond Va. where he was finally discharged at the termination of his tour and he returned home - He states that the Country was much harassed by the British and that his services during his said tour were active and uninterrupted that his Company was sometimes acting singly.

He further states that in the Month of August 1781 he again entered the service of the United States as a drafted Militia Man & private soldier upon a tour of three months in the Company of Capt. Josiah Proffitt that he again rendezvoused with his Company at the Red House in Loudoun County Va. and was attached to the Regiment Commanded by Col. James Holman - that he again came under the Command of Gen. Heade - that he was marched from his said place of Rendezvous to Williamsburg - that he was also at Richmond and Manchesterburg and was finally marched and joined the main Army towards York and was marched with that part of it under the Command of Gen. Heade to Gloucest. And there remained during the Siege of York assisting in the progress of it and witnessed the Capture of the British Army under Cornwallis - He further states that soon after the British Army left that

He he was marched together with the regiment to which he belonged to Soland's ferry on the Potomac River having with him and guard any a number of prisoners who had been taken and that he was then kept stationed guarding the said prisoners till the expiration of his tour of duty and was then discharged and returned home

He states that his memory has much failed and he cannot in consequence thereof recollect the names of many of the officers with whom he served nor can he detail many of the incidents of his service but he knows that he did not serve less than six months as a private military soldier in the Army of the Revolution and for that service he claims a pension

He states that he has no documentary evidence and that he knows of no person whose testimony he can procure who can testify to his service except Jonah Corby

He hereby relinquishes every claim whatever to a pension or annuity except the present and declares that his name is not on the Pension Roll of the Agency of any State

1<sup>st</sup> Where and in what year were you born?

Answer I was born in <sup>Pennsylvania</sup> ~~Delaware~~ in the year 1761

2<sup>d</sup> Have you any record of your age and if so where is it?

Answer I have in my Bible at home

3<sup>d</sup> Where were you living when called into service; where had you lived since the Revolutionary War, and where do you now live?

Answer I lived in Loudon County Va. when called into service and there remained till the Spring 1782 and then moved to Fairfax County Va. where I continued to live till 1807 and I then moved to Rowan County N.C. where I remained but a few months and then I moved to Emory County N.C. where I have lived ever since

4<sup>th</sup> How were you called into service, were you drafted did you volunteer, or were you a substitute and if a substitute for whom?

Answer I was drafted.

5<sup>th</sup> State the names of some of the regular officers who were with the troops whom you served such Continental and Militia Regiments

as you can recollect - and the general circumstances of your service  
Answer - I recollect Genl. Washington, Wayne, La Fayette, Stevens,  
& Meade and Col. Armstrong and Coleman. My services were  
principally in the Country between the river, York and James &  
upon the coast as well to defend & protect the Country - I was at  
the Siege of York on Gloucester side of the river and witnessed  
the Surrender of the British Army -

Q<sup>d</sup> Did you ever receive a discharge from the service and if so  
by whom was it given and what has become of it?

Answer I rec<sup>d</sup> Discharges signed by my officers, which I have lost  
Q<sup>d</sup> State the names of persons to whom you are known in  
your present neighbourhood and who can testify as to your  
Character for veracity and their belief of your service as a sol-  
-dier of the Revolution

Answer - I was named Joseph Combs and Sam<sup>l</sup> Vanhorne

 County Ky. that he is confident he is at least 70 years of age

 two years of duty of three months each in the revolution - this
