On this 21st day of August 1835 personally appears before Will. Mcracken a Justice of the Peace in and for Henry County Kentucky and one of the Justices of the Henry County Court George Jones a resident of the said County aged 70 years who is unable from bodily infirmity to attend the proper Court to make his declaration and who being first duly sworn ~~deposes~~ according to law doth on his oath make the following declaration in order to obtain the benefit of the act of Congress passed Sunday 1835.

That he entered the service of the United States under the following named officers and served as herein stated that is to say being a resident of Staquien County in the State of Virginia he entered the service of the United States in the month of October in the year 1776. as well as he remembers upon a tour of nine months as a drafted Militia Man and private soldier in the Company of Capt. So. Blackwell that he rendezvoused with his Company at Newville old Tavern about two miles below Staquien Court house and was there attached to the Regiment of Col. Churchier and was marched with the troops from said place of Rendezvous and joined the main Army of Genl. Washington in New Jersey and was marched into Pennsylvania. that during this tour the Battle of Brandywine was fought though this declarant was not engaged in it personally not being brought into the action that he continued with the Army and underwent all the privations of that fatiguing Campaign and at the termination of his tour he was discharged & returned home having served out his said term of nine months fully & faithfully.

He further states and declares that in the month of Sept^r in the year 1778 as well as he remembers he again entered the service of the United States in the Company of Capt. ^{Lawson} ~~Blackwell~~ upon a ~~three~~ ^{five} months tour as a drafted Militia man & private soldier - that he rendezvoused at the Court House in Staquien County where he still resided and camped under the command of Col. Edmunds to whose Regiment he was attached. And was marched to Summers in Prince Williams County Va. at which place the most of his services were performed - that he continued there

principally during the said term of six months but at some portion of the time was at other places on the coast and having fully and faithfully served out the said he was discharged and returned home.

He states that from his advanced age and consequent loss of memory he cannot recollect the names of officers whom he frequently saw and knew whilst in the service and that he has also forgotten many of the incidents attending his service but from his present best recollection he did not serve less than fifteen months as a private British soldier during the war of the revolution and for that service he claims a pension. He states that he has no documentary evidence and that he knows of no person whose testimony he can procure who can testify to his service.

He hereby relinquishes every claim whatever to a pension or annuity except the present and states that his name is not on the Pension Roll of the Agency of any State.

1st Where and in what year were you born?
Answer I was born in Prince William County Virginia in the year 1757 according to my best information.

2^d Have you any record of your age and if so where is it?
Answer I have none.

3^d Where were you living when called into service; where have you lived since the revolutionary war and where do you now live?
Answer I was living in Spangier County Virginia when I was called into the service and there continued to reside until about the year 1808 when I moved to Ky. where I have continued to live ever since and I now live in Henry County County Ky.

4th How were you called into the service; were you drafted, did you volunteer, or were you a substitute, and if a substitute

-tute for whom?

Answer - I was drafted into the service
of the State the names of some of the regular officers who were
with the troops where you served, such as Continental and
- later regiments as you can recollect and the general circum-
-stances of your service -

Answer - My memory has so much failed me that I do not
recollect the names of many of them - but I do recollect Capt.
Washington & Payne who were regular officers, and I recollect
Col. Churchwell and Edmunds who were Militia officers
Upon my first month's tour I served with the main Army
in New Jersey and Pennsylvania and was with it at the
battle of Brandywine - Upon my other tour I served prin-
-cipally at Hempfield in Virginia -

6th. Did you ever receive a discharge from the service, and
if so by whom was it given and what has become of it?

Answer - I received a discharge from Col. Edmunds and have
since lost it -

7th. State the names of persons to whom you are known in
your present neighbourhood and who can testify as to your char-
-acter for veracity and their belief of your service as a soldier
of the revolution -

Answer I will name Amos V. Mathews & Erasmus Bryan
as persons to whom I am known

September Term 1843

Ordered that it be certified to all whom it may concern that it was this day satisfactorily proven in Open Court to the satisfaction of the Court by the Oaths of Reuben McEnder and William Scott who are credible persons that George Jones late of Henry County Kentucky who was a revolutionary pensioner of the United States died in the month of February 1835 leaving his Widow Mary Jones who continued to survive until the month of April 1842 when she also died leaving at the time of her death the following named Children Solomon Jones, Thelminah Jones, Lettie Jones, William Jones, John Jones, Leann's Jones and Samuel Jones the last three mentioned residing in the State of Indiana and the residue in the State of Kentucky that she remained unmarried from the death of her said husband and continued his Widow until the period of her death on the same place on which her husband lived at the time of his death in the edge of Henry County Kentucky -

And at the same Court the following order was also entered on the record -

On Motion of Thomas A Berryman administrator is granted him on the Estate of Mary Jones deceased of all the goods and Chattels rights and credits of said Jones. Thereupon said

Berrymann took the oath required by law and entered into bond with George C. Meeklock his surety in the penalty of \$500 conditioned according to Law -

Be it shown that on this 5th day of Decr 1843 personally appeared before John D. McClure a justice of the peace in and for Owen County and one of the justices of the Owen County Court Thomas A. Berrymann a resident of the said County of Owen who being duly sworn according to law upon his oath stated and declared that he is the identical person appointed by the Owen County Court administrator of the Estate of Mary Jones as stated in the preceding order of Court. He further says that he was personally acquainted with Mary Jones in her lifetime and with her husband previous to his death. That the said George Jones was a revolutionary pensioner of the United States as aforesaid was informed & believed

And that after his death his widow the said
Mary Jones called upon and requested him said
Perryman to prepare a declaration for her in order
that she might obtain a pension on account of
the services of her said husband: that accordingly
on the 12th day of March 1840. he went to her house
and made out for her the annexed declaration
and wrote out the annexed dispositions in support
of her claim which were all duly and regularly
taken on said day and that the family record now
filed with the papers & attached to them is the same re-
ferred to in the declaration of Mrs Jones. He further
states that the said papers were promised to remain
in his hands by Mrs Jones he having promised
her to forward them to the proper departments and
that he neglected to do so up to the time of his
death and they have all remained in his
possession from the said 12th March 1840 up
to the present period. He further states that he
desires the pension to be which she was entitled to be
allowed to him as her administrator for distribu-
tion amongst her children - that it will be much
more convenient to procure and distribute the
money through an administrator than through
the children themselves they being so dispersed -

On this 18 day of
September 1838 personally appeared before John
Chilton a Justice of the peace in and for
Henry County Kentucky Mary Jones a resident of
Kentucky in the county of Henry aged seventy
seven years who being first duly sworn according to
law doth on her oath make the following declaration
in order to obtain the benefit of the provision made
by the act of congress passed July 14th 1836 or
the act of congress passed July 7th 1838
That she is the widow of George Jones who was a
private in the army of the revolution in the militia
service - this declarant will not however undertake
to state the particulars of the service of her husband
the said George Jones as he made a declaration
under the act of congress of June 7th 1832
and under said act was allowed a pension of
fifty dollars per annum before his death
that his certificate was retained by the pension
agent at Swanton N.Y. as well as she now recollects
She further declares that she was married to the
said George Jones on the 22 day of December

in the year Seventeen hundred and Eighty
in Loudon County State of Virginia
that her husband the aforesaid George Jones
died on the 9th day of February in Eighteen
hundred and thirty five - that declarant will
state that she cannot be certain that she was mar-
ried to the said George Jones after the expiration
of the last period of his service. for to the best of
her recollection the said George Jones perform-
ed service after they were married - but she
is very certain they were married previous to the
first of January Seventeen hundred and
ninety four or about the time above stated
she therefore hopes under the circumstances above
stated to be placed on the pension roll under
one or the other of the aforesaid acts of Congress
she will further state that she has no family
record of her marriage - and that she is unable
to attend in open court to make her declaration
by reason of bodily infirmity - and that she has
remained a widow ever since the death of
her husband as will more fully appear by
the proofs hereunto annexed she would
further state that she has small amount

which her husband's death will be of great
use and benefit to her in her old age she
therefore hopes her claims will be allowed
