Under the act of the 6th of April, 1838, entitled "An act directing the transfer of money remaining unclaimed by certain Pensioners, and authorizing the payment of the same at the Treasury of the United States," Adm^r of John Lindsey des: a Pensioner on the Roll of the Kentucky Agency, at the rate of Sixty Dollars and Cents per annum, under the law of the 7th June 1832, has been paid at this Department, from the 4th of March 1837 to the 10th Sept. 1838, the day of his death.

County Court

On this 21st day of August 1855 personally appeared before Price Mitchell a Justice of the peace in and for Henry County Ky. and one of the members of the Henry County Court John Lindsay a resident of the said County aged 74 years who by reason of his bodily infirmity is unable to attend the proper Court to make his declaration and who being first duly sworn according to law doth on his oath make the following declaration in order to obtain the benefit of the act of Congress passed June 7th 1802

That he entered the service of the United States under the following named officers and served as hired Soldier - that is to say being a resident of the County of Frederick in the State of Maryland he did about the middle of September as well as he remembers in the year 1777 enter the service of the United States as a drafted Militia Man and private Soldier upon a tour of ~~three months~~ in the Company of Captain Henry Simon Mercute that he served & was with his said Company at Frederick Town in the said County and was immediately appointed by his Captain and orderly Sergeant of the said Company and served as such during the whole of his said tour - that at their said place of Rendezvous they joined their Regiment which was commanded by Col. Beatty - that the Lieut. Colo. name was Alexander Campbell and the Major Genl. Mills that he was marched with his said Company & Regiment from his said place of Rendezvous into the State of Pennsylvania and there joined the Army of Genl Washington at what was called the White Marsh Mills - that he was attached to the Command of Genl Smallwood - that he continued with the Army during the whole of his tour and at the termination thereof was discharged & returned home - he recollects upon his tour to have seen Genl Washington, Smallwood, Lieut. of Col. Hollenworth of Blount of the Militia & Col. Morgan of the Regt Regiment

He further states and declares that afterwards in the fall of 1779 he moved to the State of Pennsylvania and in the Spring of 1780 he changed his residence to the neighborhood of Buffalo Creek upon a tract of Country over which the State of Virginia & Pennsylvania each claimed jurisdiction and in the month of April 1780 he entered the service of the United States as private volunteer the

the whole of his tour - he states that he resided with his company
at the fort at Charles Wells on Buffalo Creek and was there dis-
tanced during a portion of his tour and during the remainder
thereof he was kept engaged in scouting parties against the In-
dians that being a frontier country and much infested by
them - he states that the county in which he then lived and
in which said fort was situated was called Ohio County &
said to be in the state of Virginia - He states that there were
but few men in that section of country able to bear arms &
their vocations were in constant requisition to repel the incursions
of the savages - he states that during this tour he was not under
the command of any officer of higher grade than Captain that
he served out his tour fully and faithfully and was discharged
and immediately upon his discharge to visit in the month of Octo-
1780 the Indians still being troublesome he again entered the
service of the United States as a private volunteer soldier in
the company of Capt. Ogle upon a tour of three months - he
states that he thus volunteered without leaving the fort at Charles
Wells and that he continued in the service against the Indians
in scouting parties and in the forts in the neighbourhood as in
his first tour in the year 1780 as above set forth during the whole
of his said last mentioned tour of three months and ~~and~~
fully and faithfully served out the same he was discharged

3 He further states and declares that in the spring of the year
1781 he moved from the said County of Ohio to Westmoreland
County Pennsylvania which was also a frontier County and
soon afterwards to visit in the month of May 1781 he again
entered the service of the United States as a private volunteer
soldier in the company of Capt. Lynch upon a tour of three
months and served as such during the whole period of his
said tour against the Indians who were exceedingly trou-
blesome - that he served actively and faithfully against them
during the whole period of his said tour and was then dis-
charged - that during this tour he was under no other officer
than Capt. Lynch -

He further states and declares that in the month of March
1782 as well as he remembers he again entered the service

of the United States in the company of Capt. Lynch as a private soldier and drafted military man upon a tour of three months - that he rendezvoused with his said company at Cold Springs in Westmoreland County Pa. where by his declaration that he resided and he was immediately upon his entrance into the service appointed by his Captain orderly sergeant of his said company and served as such during the whole of his said tour - that he was marched from there with his company he was marched to Legard Station on Brandy River ^{in Westmoreland County Pa.} and was there kept stationed during his tour - that he was attached to the command of Major Wilson and had no Colonel - that Capt. Lynch had the command of the fort at Legard Station and this declaration continued there & constituted a part of the Garrison during the whole of his tour and at the termination thereof to wit in the month of June 1782 as well as he remembers he again entered the service of the United States under the command of the said Capt. and for a tour of three months ~~and~~ ~~served~~ as a private volunteer soldier and continued in the service stationed a portion of the time at the said fort at Legard Station and upon securing parties against the Indians during the whole of his tour and at the termination thereof was discharged.

He states and declares that there are some services which he performed during the revolution that he cannot now recollect with sufficient certainty to detail but he is confident from his present best recollection that he did serve in the manner and at the times above detailed and that he did not serve more than six months as a sergeant and fifteen - months as a private soldier during the revolution. And for that service he claims a pension.

He states that he has no documentary witness and that he knows of no person whose testimony he can procure who can testify to his service.

He hereby relinquishes every claim ~~whatsoever~~ to a pension or annuity except the present and declares that his name is not on the pension roll of the agency of any State. Sworn to & subscribed the day & year aforesaid

1st Where and in what year were you born
Answer I was born in Baltimore County ~~and~~ in the State of Maryland
in the year 1759 according to my information

2^d Have you any record of your age and if so where is it?
Answer I have none.

3^d Where were you living when called into the service; where have you
lived since the revolutionary war and where do you now live.

Answer - upon my first tour I lived in Frederick County in
the State of Maryland. upon my tours in 1780 I lived in Albemarle
County Va. and in my last tours I lived in Washington
County Pa. and there remained till 1784 and then I moved
to Kentucky where I have continued to reside ever since and now
I live in Henry County Kentucky.

4th How were you called into the service; were you drafted, did
you volunteer or were you a substitute, and if a substitute for
whom?

Answer - I was drafted upon some of my tours and upon ^{the} other
I was a volunteer.

5th State the names of some of the regular officers who were in
the troops where you served; such Continental and militia regiments
as you can recollect; and the general circumstances of your ser-
-vice

Answer - In the course of my service I saw Genl. Washington
Smallwood & Brig. Col. Morgan of the regulars and Col. Stollings
- worth and a ~~number~~ ^{of the militia} Monthly. upon my first tour I served
in the main army under Genl. Washington in Pennsylvania.
In my other tours I served against the Indians in the back
parts of Pennsylvania & Virginia.

6th Did you ever receive a discharge from the service, and if so
by whom was it signed and what has become of it?
Answer - I don't think I ever rec^d. of a discharge.

7th State the names of persons to whom you are known in your
present neighbourhood who can testify as to your ^{for} ~~reality~~ ^{character} and
their belief of your service as a soldier of the revolution.

Answer I will name Benjamin W. Perry & Francis Y. ones
sworn to & subscribed the day 2 years ago said.
