On the 8th day of October 1833 personally appeared in open court before the Justice of the Peace County Court now sitting James Logan a resident of the said County of Henry in the State of Kentucky aged 74 years and upwards who being first duly sworn according to law doth on his oath make the following declaration in order to obtain the benefit of the act of Congress passed June 15th 1832

12 That he entered the service of the United States under the following named officers and served as herein stated - that is to say being a resident of Morris County in the State of New Jersey he did on the - day of October 1776 as well as he remembers enter the service of the United States as a private volunteer soldier in the company of Captain David Cook upon a term of twelve months as a minute man - that he rendezvoused with his said Company at Morris town in the said County and became attached to the Regiment of Col. Cook - He states and declares that about this time ~~the~~ the British Army was making considerable advances in the State of New Jersey and this was much active operations on the part of the British and American Arms - He states that immediately upon his entrance into the service as above named he became attached to the main Army under Genl Washington and he partook of the fatigues and privations of the Campaign which followed in the fall and winter of 1776 & 77 - He states that he was under the command of Genl Dickinson during this time, that is to say, he was attached to his Brigade - He states and declares that he continued in the service actively engaged on the lines fighting in protecting and defending the Country from the depredations of the British at the least two months during his said engagement for twelve months as a minute man as above mentioned and at the expiration of that time he was discharged from further duty upon his said engagement.

10 He further states and declares that in the month of November 1777 as well as he remembers he again entered the service of the United States as a private volunteer soldier in the company of Captain William Liddell upon another engagement of twelve months as a minute man upon the lines between the lines of

the two armies - that he re-engage with his company at Morristown in the said County of Morris New Jersey in which county ~~the said~~ he this declarant thus continued to reside. that he was during his said term of engagement frequently called out to act against parties of the British from New York and Philadelphia. that he was frequently called to the vicinity of the Delaware River and engaged in aiding to protect the country - He further states that during this term of ~~his~~ engagement his company frequently acted by itself but was sometimes with other companies and under the Command of Field Officers - he states that Col. Fothergill had the Control in the main of the operations of his company. He further states that towards the conclusion of his said engagement the British Army evacuated Philadelphia and passed through New Jersey to New York - that during their progress there was a great deal of skirmishing in which this declarant was sometimes personally engaged and that at Monmouth a battle was fought between the British and American Armies in which action this declarant was personally engaged in the Brigade of Col. Dickinson - this declarant ^{states} that during this term of his engagement he is confident he did not serve up than 8 months actively and actually and upon the termination of his said engagement he was discharged -

8 He further states and declares that afterwards in the month of March in the year 1780 ~~being~~ as well as he remembers he again entered the service of the United States as a private volunteer soldier in the Company of Captain Canfield - that he again re-engage with his company at Morristown and came under the Command of Col. Jacob Arnold - He states that this engagement was also for twelve months and that his services were designed to be those of a Minute Man - He states that he was engaged actually and actively in the service against the British upon the lines in endeavouring to protect and defend the country against the British thus and their incursions at the last nine months upon this last engagement -

9 He states that from his advanced age and his consequent loss of memory he is unable to state with precision and certainly the

incidents of his service and the length time which he served upon each time he was called out but he is confident from his present best recollection that he did not serve up than twenty seven months as a private volunteer soldier in Company = Mike of Minute Men actually and actively and for that service he claims a pension.

He states that he has no documentary evidence and that he knows of no persons whose testimony he can procure who can testify to his service except his brother Solomon.

He hereby relinquishes every claim whatever to a pension or annuity except the present and declares that his name is not on the pension roll of the agency of any state.

1st Where and in what year was you born?

Answer. I was born in Morris County New Jersey in the year 1759

2^d Have you any record of your age & if so where is it?

Answer. I have at home.

3^d Where were you living when called into service; where have you lived since the revolutionary war and where do you now live?

Answer. I lived in Morris County New Jersey when I was called into the service and then continued to live till 1803 and then moved to Spangone County Ky. and there remained 6 years and then moved to Fayette County Ky. where I lived 7 years and then I moved to Henry County Ky. where I have continued to live ever since -

4th How were you called into service; were you drafted did you volunteer, or were you a substitute? And if a substitute for whom?

Answer. I was a volunteer.

5th State the names of some of the regular officers who were with the troops where you served such Continental and militia officers = regiments as you can recollect and the general circumstances of your service.

Answer. I recollect Genl. Washington, McDougall, Putnam and Green and Wayne who were regular officers and Col. Frelinghuysen Cook and Arnold of the militia - My services were those of

a Minuteman and ever confined to New Jersey Principals
against the British in endeavouring to protect and defend the
Country from their incursions - I was in the Battle of Monmouth

6th Did you ever receive a discharge from the service, and if,
so by whom was it given, and what has become of it?

Answer - I received no written discharge

I state the names of persons to whom you are known in your
present neighbourhood, and who can testify as to your character
for veracity, and their belief of your service, as a soldier of
the revolution.

The deposition of John Logan taken in New Castle Henry County Ky. on the 8th day of October 1833 to be used on the part of James Logan who is about making an application to be placed on the Pension roll of the United States as a soldier of the Revolution. - This deponent being duly sworn according to law upon his oath states that he is the brother of the said James Logan and that they were raised in Morris County New Jersey. This deponent states that he and his brother the said James Logan served a great deal together in the Revolutionary War as Minute Men. that they often served in the same Companies and he is confident that his said brother the said James Logan did not serve less in the said War than two years since he is persuaded that he did serve more than that length of time actually and actively but he is certain that he did not serve less than that length of time.

Madam:

I have to advise you that from the papers in the Revolutionary War pension claim, S. 31216, it appears that JAMES LOGAN was born in 1759 in Morris County, New Jersey.

While a resident of Morris County, New Jersey, he enlisted and served as a private with the New Jersey troops as follows:

From October, 1776, ten months in Captain David Cook's Company in Colonel Cook's Regiment.

From November, 1777, eight months in Captain William Liddle's Company; he was in the battle of Monmouth.

From March, 1780, nine months in Captain Gansteld's Company under Colonel Jacob Arnold.

He was allowed pension on his application executed October 8, 1833, at which time he was living in Henry County, Kentucky.

There are no data on file relative to his wife and children.
