State of Kentucky  
 Murray County

On this 8th day of October 1833 personally appeared in open Court before the Justices of the Murray County Court now sitting John Logan a resident of the said County aged 76 years who being first duly sworn according to law doth on his oath make the following declaration in order to obtain the benefit of the act of Congress passed June 7th 1832

That he entered the service of the United States under the following named officers and served as herein stated that is to say being a resident of Morris County in the State of New Jersey he did in the month of October 1776 as well as he remembers enter the service of the United States as a private volunteer soldier in the company of Captain David Cook upon a tour of twelve months as a minute man - that he rendezvoused with his company at Morris town in the said County and was attached to the Regiment of Col. Cook He states and declares that about this time the British Army was making some advances in the State of New Jersey & there was much active operations between the British and the American Armies - He states that immediately upon his entrance into the service as above named he was attached to the main Army under Gen. Washington and partook of all the fatigues & privations of the Campaign which ensued - He states that he was with the troops when the Battle of Trenton was fought and assisted in that enterprise and was attached to the Brigade of Gen. Dickinson whilst with the main Army. He states that he continued in the service actively engaged on the lines assisting in protecting and defending the Country from the British at least ten months during his said engagement for twelve months as a minute man as above named and was thus discharged from further duty thereunder -

He further states and declares that in the month of November 1777 as well as he remembers he again entered the service of the United States as a private volunteer soldier in the company of Captain ~~David~~ David Cook who was the same Captain who had the command upon the former engagement - that he again rendezvoused with his company at Morris town in New Jersey - that he again engaged as a minute man the difficulties of the times required that all the able bodied men should at that time in that section of Country be ready to set

forward, whenever an emergency required - He states that he still continued to reside in Morris County New Jersey. That at his said place of Residence he was attached to a Regiment Commanded by Col. Shellinghouson - He states that he was during this his second term of engagement frequently called out to act against parties of the British from New York and Philadelphia - that this second term of engagement was also for twelve months - that he was frequently called to the vicinity of the Delaware River and engaged in aiding to protect the County - He further states that during this term of his engagement his Company frequently acted by itself - He further states that toward the Conclusion of his said engagement the British Army evacuated Philadelphia and passed through New Jersey to New York. that during their Progress there was a great deal of Skirmishing between the two Armies in much of which this declarant was personally engaged - and that at Monmouth a battle was fought between the American & British Armies but this declarant was not personally engaged in it - This declarant states that during this second term as a minute man he is confident that he did not serve less than 9 months, actively and actually.

He further states and declares that in the month of January 1780 as well as he remembers, he again entered the service of the United States as a private volunteer soldier in the Company of Capt Liddle upon an engagement to serve twelve months as a minute man - That he again rendezvoused with his Company at Morristown in the County of Morris New Jersey, in which County this declarant still resided and he there came under the Command and Command of Col. ~~Smith~~ Jacob Arnold - He states that he was actually and actively engaged in the service upon this last engagement upon the line endeavouring to protect and defend the Country against the depredations of the British for at least eight months - that he was during the time engaged in many slight Skirmishes with them but in no circumstances of note.

He states that from his advanced age and consequent

Loss of memory he is unable to state with certainty and precision the incidents of his service and the length of time which he served but he is confident and certain from his present best recollection that he did not serve less than 27 months as a private volunteer soldier under engagements as a Minute Man during the War of the Revolution and for that service he claims a pension.

He states that he has no documentary evidence and that he knows of no person except his brother James Logan whose testimony he can procure by whom he can prove his service or any part of it.

He hereby relinquishes every claim whatever to a pension or annuity except the present and declares that his name is not on the pension roll of the agency of any State.

Answer I was born in Morris County New Jersey in 1757-

2 Have you any record of your age and if so where is it?  
Answer I have at home.

3<sup>d</sup> Where were you living when called into service; where have you lived since the revolutionary War and where do you now live

Answer I lived in Morris County New Jersey when called into service and there continued to live till 1785 and then moved to North Carolina and in 1803 came to Spanglin County Ky. and thence moved to Fayette County Ky. and there lived about 15 years ago and then moved to Henry County Ky. where I have lived ever since

4<sup>th</sup> How were you called into service were you drafted did you volunteer or were you a substitute and if a substitute for whom?

Answer I was a volunteer

5<sup>th</sup> State the names of some of the regular officers who were with the troops where you served such as colonels and

militia regiments as you can recollect and the general cir-  
-cumstances of your service

Answer - I recollect Capt. Washington, McDougal Pitman  
Greene and Wayne who were regular officers and Col. Cook  
Arnold and Ford who were militia officers, my services  
were those of a minute man and were confined to New  
Jersey principally against the British in endeavouring to  
protect and defend the Country from their incursions - I was  
in the Battle at Trenton -

6<sup>th</sup> Did you ever receive a discharge from the service &  
if so by whom was it given and what has become of it  
and I rec<sup>d</sup> several discharges signed by my officers  
which I have lost

7<sup>th</sup> State the names of persons to whom you are known  
in your present neighbourhood and who can testify as to  
your character for veracity and their belief of your ser-  
vice as a soldier of the Revolution

Answer I will name William S. Voiers & William Mitchell

## State of Kentucky

On this 23<sup>rd</sup> day of January one thousand eight hundred and fifty, personally appeared before the undersigned a Justice of the County Court of Henry County Christina Logan a resident of Kentucky in the County of Henry aged Seventy Four Years Who being duly sworn according to law doth on her oath make the following declaration, in order to obtain the benefit of the provisions made by act of Congress passed July 29<sup>th</sup> 1848. She states that she is the widow of John Logan who was a private in the army of the Revolution. She further states that she was married to the said John Logan on the 10<sup>th</sup> day of March one thousand seven hundred and ninety eight or near about that time having no family record to enable her to fix with exact certainty the time that her husband the aforesaid John Logan died on the 11<sup>th</sup> day of September 1841. That she was not married to him prior to his leaving the service but that the marriage took place previous to the 22<sup>nd</sup> of January eighteen hundred. (By at the time aforesaid). She further states that she is now a widow and has so remained ever since the death of her said husband and that she has never before made application for a pension. She further states that her deceased husband the S<sup>r</sup> John Logan was a pensioner of the United States and refers for proof of this statement to his certificate herewith filed

dated 2<sup>o</sup> day of December 1833. And Signed  
Lewis Cass Walker (A) and to the enclosed  
documentary and returned now in the war  
department under which her said an<sup>o</sup> husband  
formerly was his prisoner. for further evidence  
of the correctness of this statement. She further  
states that by reason of bodily infirmity  
and old age she is unable to go  
to court to make this declaration.

I hereby certify that Christina Logan  
the person making the foregoing declaration has  
been long known to me as a reliable and  
truthful person. I have long known her formerly  
as the wife and lately as the widow of John  
Logan an<sup>o</sup>. Her husband was also personally  
known to me for many years before his death.  
I also knew him to be a prisoner of the State.  
I further certify that the said Christina Logan  
has remained a widow ever since the death  
of her late husband the s<sup>o</sup> John Logan. and  
that on account of her age and bodily  
infirmity she is unable without great  
danger to seek to appear in open court.

On this 7<sup>th</sup> day of February One Thousand Eight hundred and fifty five Personally appeared before me a Justice of the peace within and for the County and State aforesaid Christiana Logan ~~aged 81 years~~ <sup>aged 81 years</sup> a resident of the County of Henry and State of Kentucky being duly sworn according to Law Declares that she is the widow of John Logan who was a Soldier in the war of the Revolution that he went from the State of Virginia and that her husband drew a pension for his services in said war that he drew Eighty Dollars per annum until he died that he died on the 11<sup>th</sup> day of Sept<sup>r</sup> 1841 that she now draws a pension for her husbands services and have continued to draw Eighty Dollars <sup>per annum</sup> ever since the year 1848 at which time the act was passed for widows of husbands of the Revolution that she has not married since his death but continues to be his widow still that all the papers proving her to be his lawful wife is now in the pension office with her declaration for a pension that her said husband never drew any land for his services in said war that she has been informed that she is entitled to bounty land for her husbands services she makes this declaration for the purpose of obtaining the bounty land to which she may be entitled to under the act passed giving to Revolutionary soldiers Bounties Land that she has not received nor is she entitled to Land bounty under any other act of Congress Christiana Logan
