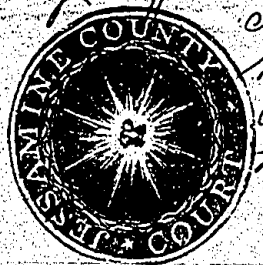

Know all men by these presents that We
Thomas Scott and James Ward are held and firmly
bound unto James Garrard Esq Governor of Kentucky
and his Successors, in the sum of Fifty pounds, current
money, to which payment well and truly to be made
to the said Governor or his Successors, We bind our-
selves our heirs be jointly and severally, firmly by these
presents sealed with our seals and dated this 22^d day
of Sept. 1800

The condition of the above obligation
is that whereas there is a marriage shortly in-
tended to be solemnized, between the above bound
Thomas Scott and Sarah Alford. Now if there
be no lawfull cause to obstruct said marriage
then the above obligation to be void else to remain
in full force and virtue.

State of Kentucky Jefferson County

On this 17th day of October 1832
personally appeared in open
Court before the Circuit Court
for Jefferson County The Honour-
able William D. Kelly Judge
The Court now sitting Thomas Scott
a President of Henry County and
State of Kentucky aged seventy nine
years next February who being first
duly sworn according to said oath
on his oath make the following
declaration in order to obtain the
benefit of the Act of Congress passed
June 1st 1832 that he believed the
same under the following facts
and served as herein stated: he states
that he was born in Pennsylvania
in the year 1754 in the beginning
of the revolutionary war he was
employed among the Republicans
settled in North Carolina in the
County of Guilford and immedi-
ately after the declaration of Independance
he was drafted & served a tour of
three months under Capt. Fletcher
Col. Martin commanded the
Militia in General Mitchell's

brigade this was in the year 1776
in 1778 he removed to the County of
Washington it then being the Western
County in the State of Virginia
where he continued to the close of
the war in the rank of Sergeant
called Mornite men and he was
frequently called out to defend
the frontier against the Indians
on one hand & the Tories of North
and South Carolina on the other
so that he was almost constantly
in the militia service of the United
States he was in the Monrovia
battle at Henrys Mountain under
Col. Campbell & Shelby and he
was then commanded by Capt
William Neil and he does not
hesitate to say that taking his
service as a soldier during the
revolutionary wars together
was in the actual service of
his Country at least twelve mon
ths.

personally appeared before me Jas. Henson
a Justice of the Peace for the County of Henry of and
and state of said Sarah Scott, and who by reason
of low health, old age and consequent infirmity
is wholly prevented from appearing in open Court
and aged seventy four years she thinks, who being
first duly sworn according to Law doth on her Oath
make the following declaration in order to obtain
the benefit of the provision made by the Act
of Congress passed July 4th 1836 and subsequent &
previous acts of Congress -

That she is the widow of Thomas
Scott who was a soldier in the Army of the
Revolution and who served some time therein, and
on account of his said services in said Army he
received a pension she thinks under the Act of
June 1832 of about forty dollars

per annum, and which pension was granted him
during his life - She further declares that she
cannot state the names of the officers or any
particular matter in regard to the services of her
said husband, but will here refer to the evidence
contained in the papers concerning the matter of
the application of her said husband for the
aforesaid services and pension granted him -

She further declares that her husband
resided in the state of Kentucky - when
he entered the service, she thinks, and that she is the
first time she has made application for her pay
owing to the fact that no person was found to do so

she states that she has documentary evidence of her marriage with said Thomas Scott, and of her being his widow which evidence is transmitted herewith.

That she was married to said Thomas Scott on the 6 day of Oct. 1808 that the said Thomas Scott her husband, died on the 24 day of Sept. 1834 and that she has remained a widow ever since that period, as will more fully appear by reference to the proof herewith sent - And she now believes that she is entitled to a pension on account of the privations, services &c of her said husband and in that she is poor having nothing and no estate, living on the charity of friends and therefore respectfully asks her government for a pension or aid as the nature of her case & the circumstances may require and that a certificate may issue to her and be enclosed to Edmund P. Thomas of New Castle Henry County State of Kentucky & Sarah ^{her} Scott

And I Jas Henson the said Justice of the peace for said County of Henry & State of Kentucky do hereby Certify that the foregoing declarant Sarah Scott is a credible person, and all her statements entitled to the fullest credit - and I know her to be the widow of the aforesaid Thomas Scott, and that she has never again married since the death of said Tho. Madam:

I have to advise you that from the papers in the Revolutionary War pension claim R. 3315 it appears that Thomas Scott was born February 22, 1754 in Pennsylvania, the place not stated.

He enlisted in Guilford County, North Carolina in 1776 and served three months as a private in Captain Fleck's Company, Colonel Martin's North Carolina Regiment.

He moved to Washington County, Virginia in 1778 and was a minute man to the close of the war. He served whenever called upon to guard the frontiers against Indians and Tories, first as private, then Orderly Sergeant and later Lieutenant, nine months actual service in all.

He was at the battle of Kings Mountain under Cap-

tain William Neal and Colonels Campbell and Shelby.

He also served as Captain in an Indian War, no details of said service given.

He was allowed pension on his application executed October 17, 1832 in Jessamine County, Kentucky, his former residence, but then a resident of Henry County, Kentucky. He died September 24, 1834.

Soldier married October 6, 1800 in Jessamine County, Kentucky, Sally or Sarah Ward born May 29, 1769. She was living in Henry County, Kentucky in 1844.
