He makes this declaration for the purpose of obtaining the bounty land to which he may be entitled to (as the next friend of the aforesaid Joseph Wallace only minor heir of Joshua and Elizabeth Wallace aforesaid) under the act approved March the 3rd 1855. 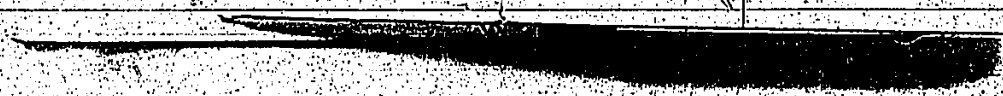

appeared before me David Adams one of the Justices of the
Peace in and for Hannabury and one of the Judges in
and for said County Nelson Adams aged 39 years who
being first duly sworn according to Law swore on his oath
to make the following declaration in order to obtain the
benefits of an act of Congress, to wit the 14th of June 1832

That said said State that he was residing in the County of
Adair State of South Carolina - when he was called into
the service of the United States and served as Surgeon
Major in the 1st Regiment of Artillery in the month
of August 1817 as well as the 1st Regiment of Artillery

unprotected that the Tories and British would destroy
it. He states that whilst he was there he saw that
Maxfield Angus was supplied with bread from
the aforesaid Mill and that during his time
in office he was engaged in guarding said
Mill and was discharged by the said Capt
Chauman some time in the month of Nov 1817

after being discharged he states that he returned to his
father's house in said town of Abbeville where he
remained until the month of May 1768 when he
volunteered under Capt. Mangier for a tour of
six months and was attached to his company of
Mangier as soon as the company to which he was
attached had equipped themselves for a campaign
they were marched by his said Capt. Mangier in
pursuit of British and Tories who were committing
many outrages upon the frontiers and upon the
parts of the settlements, he states that during the six
months tour he was employed in recruiting and
treasuring the frontiers in various quarters and
giving security to the alarmed inhabitants after
having served out his six months tour he was
discharged some time in the month of Nov 1770

he further states that sometime in the year of 1779 about
the month of June he thinks the Cherokee tribe of
Indians aided by some Tories were becoming more
obnoxious upon the frontiers and had committed
some acts of violence both upon the persons and
property of the inhabitants it became necessary that
a company of militia should be raised to their protection
and upon them against such violations when
Capt. Bennett Monro raised a company of
volunteers for three months he states that he was

not under command of Monro for three months and
did march with the company of 100 men from Abbe-
ville County to the frontier of North Carolina and
upon the frontier he states that they were employed
in traversing the country in various directions
and after having served out his three months
for which he had no intention he was discharged
by Capt. ~~Leach~~ ^{Leach} sometime in Sept. in the year
1779. He further states that immediately after being
discharged by Capt. Monro that a draft was
ordered and took place in Abbeville County and

under that draft he was drafted for a term of
six months he states that ^{the} company was ordered in the
month of Oct. and under command of Abbeville Convention
and was marched out under General Pickens
who commanded the regiment, and Col. ~~Pruss~~ ^{Pruss} in
Major Ford, and Capt. ~~Leach~~ ^{Leach}, they marched from
Paris Court house to Bacon's Bridge across
Ashby River, the object was to prevent the British
from crossing the river at this place, he states
that whilst they were thus stationed that soon
after came for General Pickens' regiment
to under with General Greene who was stationed
about seven miles from the bridge, he states that
General Pickens' Regiment took up the line of march
and joined General Greene's Regiment when it was

That General Pickens's arguments should take the form and
of March, he states that from the army under the
Command of General Greene was then marched to
Rabun County, and after remaining there some time
they were ordered back and stationed at Camp
Bacon Bridge, and after the six months for which
he was ordered had expired he states that
the United States General Pickens was marched
to Abbeville for the purpose of being appointed
as a guard over the baggage-waggon which
was to take the provisions with the army and a deliver-
ance the baggage returned to him in a black
house in said County of Abbeville, where the
was discharged in the month of March 1780

The accounts for the State that during the Summer
of 1780 that the Cherokee tribe of Indians aided by
some Tories were committing many depredations
upon the frontiers, General Pickens ordered a
draft of sixty days when he was again ordered and
marched under Lieutenant Heats from Abbeville
County to the Cherokee Nation where they were com-
mited by General Pickens. They then pursued the Indians and
brought them into the Indian Country, and in the month
of ^{June} took Indians and Tories and carried them into
the settlements of General Pickens then ordered

about March, had the Garrison used and
 the money to me they returned to the King, which
 return was received in Abbeville County near the
 Court house in the month of Nov. 1780 the
 State that this day, anything indeed he was discharged
 by his Lieutenant into the service in Nov 1780. He
 states that he has no documentary evidence of his service
 and knows of no living soldier by whom he can prove
 that service he truly relinquishes any claim whatever
 to a pension or annuity except the present and

Dear Sir:

You are advised that it appears from the papers in the Revolutionary War pension claim, W. 11721, that Joshua Wallace was born in 1761, in County Tyrone, Ireland. The names of his parents are not given.

While a resident of Abbeville County, South Carolina, he enlisted and served as a private with the South Carolina troops, as follows:

From August, 1777, three months under Captain Samuel Roseman; from May, 1778, six months in Captain Maxfield's Company of Rangers; from about June, 1779, three months under Captain John Norwood; from October, 1779, six months under Captain Liddle or Lidell and Colonel Anderson; in the summer of 1780, sixty days under Lieutenant Watts, and was in a skirmish with the Indians and Tories.

He was allowed pension on his application executed December 23, 1833, at which time he was living in Henry County, Kentucky, where he had lived since 1805.

He died February 27, or March 1, 1847, in Henry County, Kentucky.

The soldier married December 23, 1831, in Franklin County, Kentucky, Elizabeth, the widow of Peter Onan. Her maiden name was Brewer.

She was allowed pension on her application executed March 16, 1853, at which time she was a resident of Henry County,

Kentucky, and she then stated that she was fifty-seven years of age.

In 1869 she stated that she was sixty-six years of age.

She died at Lockport, Kentucky, August 20, 1870.

Reference was made to the soldier's first wife, and children, but no names were given.

The War of 1812 records of this bureau fail to afford any information in regard to pension having been claimed on account of the services of a soldier named Joshua Wallace.
