It is known that on the 21st day of Sept. 1835, personally appeared before William McCrackin a Justice of the Peace and for the County of Albany a member of the Albany County Court, Isaac Ward Young a resident of the said County of Albany, aged 73 years who being first duly sworn according to law did on his oath make the following declaration in order to obtain the benefit of the act of Congress passed June 7th 1832.

That he entered the service of the United States under the following name: officer and served as herein stated, that is to say, being a resident of Frederick County in the State of Maryland he did on the day of July in the year 1778 he entered the service of the United States as a draught Militia man and private soldier in the Company of Captain Price that he rendezvoused with his company at Liberty in Frederick County Maryland that his term was for 3 months that he was attached to the Regiment of Col. Storer that he was marched from thence and joined the main Army under the Command of Genl Washington near Lancaster in Pennsylvania that the Army was marched from Lancaster to Dunbarton on the Brandywine that he continued with the Army and made with it a place called the White Plains and from thence to the Delaware. He states that he continued with the Army in all its evolutions during the period of his said tour and faithfully and fully served out the same and was at the termination thereof discharged that he was during this service attached to the Command of Genl Morgan. I recollect upon this tour to have seen Genl Washington & Wayne.

He further states and declares that sometime in the month of July 1781 as well as he at present remembers he again entered the service of the United States as a private soldier and draught Militia man in the Company of Captain Mearns ^{upon a term of three months} that he rendezvoused with his company at Sharps Ferry on the Potomac River and thence came under the Command of Col. Proffit ^{as well as he recollects the name} that he was marched from his said place of Dunbarton by his said Col. and joined the main Army of Genl Washington and marched to York and was present and assisted at the siege of that place and witnessed the surrender of the British Army under Cornwallis that he continued in the service ^{was} after the siege of York marched to Frederick Town in Maryland and was thence kept stationed and assisted in guarding a number of prisoners at that place that he

been taken with Cornwallis. He states that during this tour he was under the Command of Genl Lawson - that he remained at said -
-town in Maryland as a portion of the guard as aforesaid till the expiration of his said tour and was then discharged his said tour having been for three months.

He further states and declares that afterwards in the month of July - in the year 1783 as well as he remembers, he moved from the said County of Frederick Maryland and went to Fort Pitt where Pittsburg now stands and arrived there in the month of March in the said year as well as he remembers and there remained as a volunteer soldier in the fort at that place under the Command of Capt Ritchie as a part of the Garrison of that place for one month - and at the expiration of that time in the month of April in the year 1783 he again entered the service of the United States as a private volunteer soldier in the Company of Capt Sumner and was immediately ~~was~~ conducted by him down the Ohio River upon an expedition against the Indians - that he continued upon the service with the said Sumner during his whole tour which was for three months and served the same out fully and faithfully - that in descending the Ohio River from Pittsburg they had many difficulties with the Indians and they finally landed at the mouth of Licking in Ky. It was over on the opposite side of the river where Cincinnati now stands and built a fort - that after the full expiration of his tour he was discharged by his Capt and went down to the falls of the Ohio where Louisville now stands.

He states that during his services against the Indians and also his services against the Parliab he was engaged in no Battle of any moment ~~at~~ except that which took place at York when Cornwallis was taken but that he had many slight skirmishes with them.

He states that his memory has greatly failed him from his advanced age but he is certain from his present best recollection he did not serve up than 10^{ten} months as a private soldier during the revolutionary war (11 months as volunteer and 6 months as a drafted Militia man) and for the said services he claims a pension.

He states that he has no documentary evidence of his services and

that he knows of no person whose testimony he can procure who can testify to the same -

He hereby relinquishes every claim whatever to a pension or annuity except the present and declares that his name is not on the pension Roll of the army of any State

1st Where and in what year were you born?

Answer I was born in Frederick county Maryland in the year 1760

2^d Have you any record of your age, and if so where is it?

Answer I have a record of my age at home -

3^d Where were you living when called into service, where have you lived since the revolutionary war, and where do you now live?

Answer I lived in Frederick's County Maryland when I was called into service upon my two first tours - Upon my other I was at fort

Pitt when I entered the service when I left the service I went to Leesville where I now live. ^{remained for some time then moved to Bullitt county Ky & from thence to Henry county Ky where} 4th How were you called into service, were you drafted and your volunteer or were you a substitute? and if a substitute for whom?

Answer I was a drafted militia man upon my two first tours - upon my other I was a volunteer -

5th State the names of some of the regular officers who were with the troops where you served; such Colonels and militia Regiments as you can recollect and the general circumstances of your service?

Answer I recollect Col. Washington, Wayne, Smallwood, Brundage and Col. Clarke & Greene who were regular officers. I recollect also to have seen Col. Matthews, Glascock & Pendleton

who were militia officers - upon my first tour I was with the

Army under Col. Washington and continued with it in its operations against the British Army under Col. Howe in the spring of the year 1778

and until the expiration of my tour - Upon my second tour I was at the siege of York & capture of Cornwallis and afterwards spent in guarding a portion of the prisoners at Fredericktown in Maryland Upon my third tour I was at fort Pitt as a part of the Garrison for

one month and upon my last tour I went down the river as far as the mouth of Hickling and was over at the place where be-
-cunally now stands and assisted in the erection of a fort
6th Did you ever receive a discharge from the service and if so by
whom was it given, and what has become of it.

Answer I received several discharges signed by my officers, but have
lost them.

Y^e states the names of persons to whom you are known in your
present neighbourhood and who can testify as to your character for
veracity and their belief of your service as a soldier of the revolu-
-tion.

Answer I will name Sal Hedwell and Roger Owens

On this ~~thirtieth~~ ^{thirtieth} day of May 1850, before me, the subscriber, a Justice of the Peace for the said County of Ripley personally appeared Stanard Younger who, on this oath, declares that he is the same person who formerly belonged to the Company commanded by Captain Morgan and in the Regiment commanded by Colonel Bird in the service of the United States; that his name was placed on the pension roll of the State of Kentucky whence he has lately removed; that he now resides in the State of Indiana where he intends to remain, and makes his pension to be thus payable, in future. The following are his reasons for removing from Kentucky to Indiana - He some years since made arrangements to live in the family of Sophia King a step son-in-law during his (Younger's) natural life and the said Sophia having removed to the State of Indiana he was of necessity compelled to accompany them.

KANARD YOUNGER-S. 32620

Kanard Younger was born in the year 1760, in Frederick County, Maryland; the names of his parents and day of his birth are not stated.

While a resident of Frederick County, Maryland, he enlisted in February, 1778, and served three months as private in Captain Price's company, Colonel Bird's ^{regiment} of Maryland troops. He enlisted in July, 1781, served three months as private in Captain Maready's company, under Colonel Respass and was at the Siege of Yorktown and the surrender of Cornwallis. The soldier moved about February, 1783, from Frederick County, Maryland, to Fort Pitt, ^{near} Pittsburg, Pennsylvania, ~~now stands~~; he volunteered in March, 1783 and served one month in Captain Ritchie's company at the garrison there; from sometime in April, 1783, he served three months in Captain Simms' company on an expedition down the Ohio River against the Indians.

After his services in the Revolution, he ^{remained at the place which was} ~~remained at the place which was~~ Louisville, Kentucky, ~~now stands~~, then moved to Bullitt County, Kentucky, thence to Henry County, in that state.

He was allowed pension on his application executed September 21, 1833, at which time he resided in Henry County, Kentucky.

In May, 1850, Kanard Younger had moved from Kentucky to Ripley County, Indiana. He lived there in the family of Joshua King, his step son-in-law. There are no further information regarding the soldier's family.

Kanard Younger died August 2, 1851. ^{A. P.}
