

I, J. M. Putman do make and publish this instrument as my last will and testament.

1<sup>st</sup> I will and bequeath all my property real personal and mixed to my wife Nannie J. Putman during the term of her natural wife giving her full power to sell dispose of and convey any property of which I may die seized and possessed and to use, enjoy and dispose of, as she may see fit, the proceeds of such sale or sales.

2<sup>nd</sup> In the event of the death of my wife before the sale or disposal of all of the property herein bequeath to her It is my will that it shall be and become the property of our three children Georgia, Lucy A. and Joseph P. This section applies only to such property as my wife may have failed to sell before her death.

3<sup>rd</sup> In the event of the death of my wife before I shall die, I will & bequeath all of my said property to our said three children Georgia, Lucy A. and Joseph P.

4<sup>th</sup>. I appoint my wife Nannie J. Putman the Executrix of this Will and ask that the Court shall not require any bond of her for the performance of her duties hereunder.
