On this 15th day of October 1832, personally examined in the

Revolutionary War in favor of George Washington
that after remaining a short time he proceeded on under
the same command officers who attached under the
Command of Commodore Paul Jones and was then attached to the
Main Army at White Haven and was then attached to the
Savannah Brigades; that he continued at that time in
Savannah Brigades till the end of the Revolution three months - 2 days
when he received a shot to his duty as a substitute though car-
ried on the 2nd of April 1781 he was
not now present account the year 3rd On Apr. 1781 he was

drafted and marched with the Militia from Culpeper County
Virginia under the command of Col. Lewis Slaughter; Capt. Ross
Pollard, Lieut. James Grimes Hensley - several were the Com-
pany officers - that they proceeded down to James River, crossed it
at Sandy point and were attached to Genl. Lee's left wing
Command - that he remained on the south side of the
River, continually in motion until the battle at Petersburg
when he recrossed the River and joined the Army under
the Command of Genl. Lt. Fay, the 1st Readmont City &
on the 29th May the Confederate Militia were discharged at
Danbridge Mills about twenty miles above Richmond.
Lastly he was ordered down in the month of Aug
4. and lastly he was ordered down in the month of Aug
or September 1781 to Williamsburg under the command of Capt
Watts and joined the brigade of Genl. Edward Stevens
and after maneuvering thro that part of the State he
finally proceeded with the Army to the Siege of York
remaining there until the Surrender of Lord Com-
wallis and marched from thence with the Prisoners
to the Winchester barracks and at the termination he
received an honorable discharge - that these discharges have
been from the great loss of time from all damage or cost
and that he has no documentary evidence whatever of his
services nor is there any man living in this part of the
Country that has any personal knowledge of the service
rendered - that he was born & raised in the County of Culpeper

and state of Virginia and that from the information of his father he was born ~~on~~^{at} the 27th day of April 1759 - that he lived in the County of Culpeper until the Spring of 1795 when he removed to Kentucky and has resided there ever since. he earnestly states that he is confident of having faithfully served his Country in the several towns more than seven months.

Sir Having corresponded with the
Commissioner of Pensions on the subject of the
Pension of Edmund Archer he informed me that
the said Archer was pensioned on the 16th of March
1833 at the rate of \$23³³ per Annum from the 4th
March 1831. The Commissioner also informed me
that by addressing you I could get the inform
ation I desire. Now I wish to know why my Father
Edmund Archer was pensioned at \$23³³ per Annum
and other Soldiers of the Revolution at \$96 per
Annum. Secondly my Father I think never got a Land
Warrant. Thirdly I have been informed that Congress
once passed an act allowing the soldiers of the Revolution
half pay for life and that it was afterwards committed
to five years full pay now of this my Father drew
nothing. I also have been informed that by making
inquiry at the Pension Office I would get inform
ation interesting to the Heirs of Edmund Archer.
Now as I have been referred to you for information
if you can answer the foregoing questions or give me
any other information on this subject it will be

Dear Madam:

The data pertaining to Edmund Archer which follow were obtained from the papers on file in pension claim, S.12936, based upon his service in the War of the Revolution.

Edmund Archer was born April 27, 1759, in Culpeper County, Virginia, names of his parents not given.

While residing in Culpeper County, he enlisted in the latter part of the year, 1777, and served three months in Captain Ephraim Rucker's company, Colonel James Pendleton's Virginia regiment. After the expiration of this service, he served a short tour, dates and officers not shown. He enlisted April 2, 1781, and served until May 29, 1781, in Captain Robert Pollard's company in Colonel James Slaughter's Virginia regiment. He enlisted sometime in August or September, 1781, served in Captain Watts' Virginia company, was in the Siege of Yorktown and after the surrender of Cornwallis, marched with the prisoners to Winchester Barracks, length of this service not stated.

Edmund Archer continued to live in Culpeper County, Virginia until sometime in 1795, when he moved to the state of Kentucky. He was allowed pension on his application executed, October 15, 1832, then residing in Oldham County, Kentucky.

Jesse W. Archer, son of the soldier, Edmund Archer, gave his address in 1859, French Lick, Orange County, Indiana, and he at this time referred to a sister then living in Kentucky. The name of his sister and that of their mother are not shown and there is no further reference to children of the soldier.

If you desire information in regard to the last payment of pension, name and address of person paid, and possibly the date of death of Edmund Archer, you should address the Comptroller General, General Accounting Office, this city and cite the following:
