State of Kentucky.

Alachua County, Ga.

On this 7th day of September 1830 personally appeared in Court before Thomas T. Brantley the ~~County~~ ^{County} Clerk of the Court of the State of Georgia, the force in respect of the County of Alachua and State of Kentucky, aged about 20 years, who being first duly sworn, proceeded to the following declarations in order to obtain the benefit of the act of Congress passed some 7th 1830 - That he entered the service of the United States under the following named officer & served as private in the 1st Regt. That he was born in the County of Prince Edward in the State of Virginia in the year 1810 that his father had a record of his age that his father emigrated to Kentucky in early times & after his family were taken prisoner and the record of his age with everything else destroyed by the Indians and that he was no record of it himself. That he lived in the County of Prince Edward and State of Virginia until called into service, that after the war broke out there he lived about 1815 years in British Carolina that he then removed to the State of Kentucky then settled in County of Alachua where he has lived ever since and holds no more slaves. That the first town of duty which he performed was as a volunteer in the Militia of Virginia that he went out under Capt. Cunningham to North Carolina that after arriving in North Carolina, Capt. Cunningham with his Company including himself was attached to the Regulars commanded by General Stevens, that he then marched out to the battle of Guilford in North Carolina that the whole army was then under the command of General Greene, that a few days after the battle he received his written discharge from Capt. Cunningham at a place called Ramsay Mills - that the term of his service for which he had volunteered then expired - that he returned home about one month and then went out as a volunteer for his brother Melvin's force under Capt. Watson that he

marched with Capt Watson across James River for the
purpose of preventing any further operations which the British
were committing in that quarter, that General Lawson
was the chief officer at that time he served with Capt
Watson two months & returned home & held a short
time and then took the place of Subst of com as a sub
altern under Capt Coe, under General Lawson
and went out beyond James River for the purpose
of preventing the incursions of the British, that
he served with Capt Coe two months & discharged
the fort's company he served he went out under
Capt Moseley that he marched straight out to the
siege of York, that he remained at York until after
the day before Cornwallis's surrender, when he
and the whole of Capt Moseley's Company were
sent with some prisoners up to White Sulphur Springs
and after serving two months was discharged at
White Sulphur Springs that he entered the revolutionary war
in the last year of the same but at what particu-
lar time he does not know this great lapse of time recollect
he remembers that a brother of Capt Cunningham was
the lieutenant in his Company but he does not remember
the names of the inferior officers in the other Compa-
ny that the Articles of Association which he received
have all but lost or destroyed that he has no docu-
mentary evidence to establish the foregoing facts and he
knows of no person by whose testimony he can procure
except ^{from the papers of the} above affidavit is hereby
attested the State that he served in all right know-
th during the revolution, & he hereby relinquishes every
claim whatever to a pension or annuity except the
present and declares that his name is not on the pen-
sion roll of any of our States.
