Commonwealth of Kentucky, Oldham County. - ¹⁸³²

In this 18th day of September, 1832; - Personally appeared before the Hon^t the Judge of the Circuit Court of the State, and County aforesaid now sitting: Thomas George a resident of said State, and County, - aged 72 Years, - who being first duly sworn according to Law doth, on his oath, make the following declaration, in order to obtain the benefit of the act of Congress, passed the 7th day of June, 1832.

That (agreable to his Father's register) he was born in the year 1759 - Oct^o 17th in the State of Virginia, and County of Hanover - That he removed from Hanover County on the first day of Nov^o 1776, to Lunenburg County, in the same State, where he resided until he first entered the service of the United States, - and some time in the summer, or autumn of 1778, he was drafted in the State Militia for the defence of Norfolk, and Williamsburg, and ordered out for terms of three months - was discharged at Lynchburg City (County) Court house some few days before the turning of four winter, (probably 11, or 12 days) - and that in December 1780, he entered the service as a Volunteer, in the Company commanded by Capt. Silvanus Walker - 1st Lt. Col^o, James Stoddard 2^d Lt. Col^o, Matthew Flury Ensign Peter Stokes, - this was raised in the Counties of Lunenburg & Rockingham, and marched from time to march, and aid Gen^t Greene, who was then flying before the Enemy for want of Troops, and, in the Month of February 1781, Capt^o Walker with his company joined Gen^t Greene's Head Quarters at the Red House in Cowpens County, North Carolina (Known by the name of Dobbins's) From the 1st March to several ^{the} ^{11th at Camp near Gafford Springs} zig-zag directions, until Wednesday evening March 11th on Thursday 12th about between 11 A.M. and 1 P.M. the American Army Commanded by Gen^t Greene, and the British Army Commanded by Lord Cornwallis met, and were engaged in the Woods, some small distance S. of Gafford Court house, in said State of N. Carolina, when, and where, a bloody engagement took place, it continued several hours, in which an Englishman received a wound through his right side a little below his ribs - Lieutenant Flury, a ball through his left hip, and by the vigilance of friends both brought off the field of action. The American army retreated to Flock's Iron Works - a distance from the scene of action continued at said rendezvous until Monday the 19th of March on which day Gen^t Greene, with the American Brigade General, Col^o Nathaniel, Col^o, Capt. Silvanus Walker U.C.V.C to whose Brigade, Regiment, and Company, this applicant was attached, took up the line of battle in front of Ramsey's Mill, where skirmishes took place - these marches in various routes until the 8th of Sept 1781, and at Eatow Springs, where the American army Commanded by Gen^t Greene, and the British, under Lord Cornwallis, again confronted each other, in a bloody conflict of several hours, in which this applicant was discharged sometime in the Month of Sept 1781, but through a lapse of time, have lost or mislaid his discharges. He also states that he has no other evidence of his service as a Revolutionary Soldier, except that of Capt. Thomas Gains, whose affidavit, and statement is

herewith transmitted to the department. He hereby relinquishes all & every claim whatever to a pension, or annuity, except the present, and declares that his name (to his knowledge or belief) is not ~~in~~^{any} list of pensioners or agency of any state in the union - Sworn to and Subscribed the day and year aforesaid. *Thomas George*
N.B. The former, 1778 was under Cap. Wm. Mumpford

named Thomas George for upwards of thirty years, having lived in the
same neighbourhood where he resided in Virginia until removed
to Oldham in the state of Kentucky in the Year 1822, and still lives
in the same neighbourhood, in Oldham County, Kentucky, wh^{ch} has
subscribed, and sworn to the above declaration, and have no doubt
but that his age, as he has stated, and that he was a soldier, and
believed, where resided in Virginia, and is considered to be a man
of honourable deportment, and strict veracity, in the County and in
the neighbourhood where he now resides, and we have no hesitation in
saying that we believe that he was a soldier in the revolution & in
which opinion we concur. The above certificate Subscribed and

Dear Madam:

Reference is made to your letter in which you request the Revolutionary War records of Thomas George of Virginia, and John Tugman of the Virginia State Navy.

The records of Thomas George and John Tugman are furnished herein as found in pension claims based upon service in the Revolutionary War.

THOMAS GEORGE-S. 16821.

Thomas George was born October 17, 1759, in Amelia County, Virginia; the names of his parents were not shown. He moved from said Amelia County, November 1, 1776, to Limestone County, ~~Virginia~~, and resided there during the period of the Revolutionary War.

Thomas George enlisted in the summer or autumn of 1778, and served three months as private in Captain William Manford's Virginia company, and was discharged at Charles City Court House. He enlisted in December 1780, served as private in Captain Sylvania Walker's company, Colonel Nathaniel Cocke's Virginia regiment, was in the battles of Guilford Court House, Ramsour's Mills and Eutaw Springs and was discharged sometime in September 1781.

The soldier moved about the year 1822, from Virginia to Oldham County, Kentucky.

He was allowed pension on his application executed September 18, 1832, at which time he resided in Oldham County, Kentucky. In September 1839, Thomas George was a resident of Jefferson County, Indiana, having moved there from Kentucky.

No reference was made to wife or children of Thomas George.

JOHN TUPMAN - R. 104.

John Tupman resided in Westmoreland County, Virginia, previous to the Revolutionary War. His age was not stated, nor the date and place of his birth and the names of his parents given.

John Tupman was a sailing master in the Virginia State Navy during the Revolutionary War, at one time was taken prisoner by the British, and continued in service until the reduction of that navy in 1781. The length of service and other details were not given.

About April 1798, he went on board a vessel bound for the West Indies, which vessel and crew were lost at sea, presumably about 1801; said John Tupman never returned.

John Tupman was survived by a widow, who died many years prior to 1834, whose name was not given, and also by two children, William Tupman of Adair County, Kentucky, in 1834 and resided there still in 1864, and Emily, who married Benjamin Settles; said Nancy was deceased in 1834, and was survived by four children, given in 1834, as Louisa, who married John Clark, Matilda, who married Thomas Smith, Emily, who married Thomas Stubbs, and Sally, who married Lonsey (?) or Sansey(?) Stubbs.

The Virginia half pay which was due on account of service of John Tupman, sailing master, Virginia State Navy, War of the Revolution, was allowed his heirs in 1847.

He was allowed 1000 acres of bounty land by the State of Kentucky on account of his service in the Virginia State Navy on warrant #213. Information regarding this land might be obtained from the Librarian, Virginia State Library, Richmond, Virginia.
