resident of said County of Johnson aged eighty two
years, who being duly sworn according to law, doth
on her oath make the following declaration in order to ob-
tain the benefit of the provisions made by the act of Congress
passed February 3rd 1853. That she is the widow of
John Netherton who, as Captain and Major of the Revolution-
ary Wars, was a Prisoner under and by the act of
Congress passed June 17th 1832, that the amount of pension
he drew was one hundred and thirty five dollars every
six months, that his residence was in Oldham County in the
State of Kentucky, that the agency at which his pen-
sion was paid was at Lexington in said State of
Kentucky, and that he drew his pension up to 11th Sept
1834. She further declares that she was married to the
said John Netherton on the fifth day of May A.D. 1808,
That her husband the aforesaid John Netherton died on
the 31st day of October A.D. 1834. She further swears that
she was a widow at the passage of the act, and is still a
widow, and that she has never before made application
for a pension.

That he entered the
service of the United States under the
following named officers & served as
is herein after named. He started in
the year 1776 or 1777 he was in the
county of Shenandoah in the State of
Virginia he was appointed & com-
m^ded ^{by the governor of Virginia} a captain of Militia and
in 1776- & 1777- was ordered to join the
army he cannot recollect the place
where he joined the army - He recollects
his pass^d through Tennessee from Maryland
he was in company with Captain McRae
the two companies together with 100 men
his two lieutenants were named Wm Thomas
& Henry Robertson his Ensign was named
William Bryan. Abraham Boyd was

one of Capt. Brown's lieutenant. He was
a volunteer & saw a short military
campaign. He was not in any battle
nor can he recall the names of
any of the regular officers - After he
returned home a requisition was made for
men to join Gen. McIntosh to go against
the Indians - He was commissioned
a Major ^{by the gov. & was} his colonel
the detachment marched to San Pedro
- look through over the ^{mountains} through
Hampshire county to the Monongahela
river where Col. Richard Campbell
of the regular army took the command
and on their march met Gen.
Gen. McIntosh at a place called
where he remained until discharged
This campaign was three months in
duration. He was a volunteer - Colonel
Tipton was the adjutant of the
All was regiment - He was in the Engage-
ment. After his return he was
commissioned a Col. ^{from the gov. of Virginia} in requisition
was made for volunteer militia just
previous to the surrender of Fort
- Wallaces the men were to rendezvous
at ^{Fredricksburg} - He states he expected
them as decided, but there were
appearing a sufficiency of men
Gen. Tipton who was present (as was
Gen. Lafayette) directed him to

return & get some more
letters - He did so but before
he had procured the number
he was ⁱⁿ news of the surrender of
Covington & did not again
join the army - ~~He~~ about the
year 1790 he moved from ~~the~~ to the
State of Tennessee and settled on
the river called French Broad where
he resided about five years then
he removed to Jefferson county in
the State of Kentucky where he resided
until a few years past he moved
to where he now lives in Shelby county
which is not more than ten miles
westward from his residence in Jefferson
He has had his home burnt with all
his papers amongst which ^{was} his
commissions - He knows of no persons
by whom he can prove his services
except by his two sons John & Henry
the latter the hereby relinquishes every
claim to a pension or any way of
the present & demands that his name be
put on the pension roll of the agency of
any State sworn to and subscribed
the day & year as above

Also personally appeared in open court
before me James Todd Circuit Judge
of the same county of Shelby Henry
Netherton who states that he well
recollects that his father states
and that he was a companion in the war
in many arms, but he ~~cannot~~
recollect the particular date
or length of the different campaigns.
He states that his father's home
with all his property was destroyed
by fire. Henry Netherton

John Netherton also being sworn states
he is a younger brother of Henry
Netherton - that he recollects
his father's service in the war
in the revolution. John Netherton

Netherton and John Netherton are respectable & credible persons
and that their statement is entitled to credit.

Sir:

I have to advise you that you are herewith furnished the histories of the two Revolutionary War pensioners, as requested.

It is proper to add that not more than two such abstracts are furnished to any person or organization, owing to the great pressure of current work, the large number of similar inquiries, and the lack of a clerical force available for such a purpose.

The Revolutionary War records of this Bureau are open to the public for research work, under the provisions of the Act of March 3, 1901, and you or any one designated by you, may examine and collect data from Revolutionary War pension claims, by calling at the Bureau, which is the usual practice.

You may however obtain photostat copies of papers in Revolutionary War pension claims, whenever you desire,

as the requests of that nature, are not limited to two inquiries.

From the papers in the Revolutionary War pension claim, W. 5416, it appears that John Netherton, while residing in Shenandoah County, Virginia, in 1776 or 1777 served three months as a Captain in the Virginia Troops.

He also served three months as a Major in the Virginia Troops, under Colonels Thomas Allan and Richard Campbell, marched to the Monongahalia River and joined General McIntosh at Wheeling, no dates stated.

He was allowed pension on his application executed July 26, 1832, while a resident of Shelby County, Kentucky, aged eighty-five years. He died in Oldham County, Kentucky, October 38, 1832 or October 31, 1834.

Soldier married May 5, 1808 in Jefferson County, Kentucky, Rebecca, widow of John Frasier. She was allowed pension on her application executed July 20, 1855, while a resident of Johnson County, Indiana, aged eighty-one years.

In 1833, soldier's sons, Henry and John, stated

that they recollected that their father served in the Revolutionary War.

There is no further data on file relative to family.

From the papers in the Revolutionary War pension claim, S. 2334, it appears that William Hopwood was born February 9, 1765 in Shenandoah County, Virginia.

While residing in said county, he enlisted in 1781, before Cornwallis was captured, and served two months as a private in Captain George Prince's Virginia Company.

After this he served nearly six months in Captains Groome' and Fry's Virginia Companies, and guarded the prisoners at Winchester Barracks.

He was allowed pension on his application executed October 31, 1832, while a resident of Fairfield County, Ohio. He died October 18, 1833.

It is not stated that soldier was married.
