Worble taken in Oldham county Kentucky on the  
Eighth day of October 1838

This affiant who being first duly  
sworn according to law doth on his oath depose and  
say, that he is the son of Henry Worble and Margaret  
his wife - that his father was a soldier of the revolution  
and was a pensioner some years before his death  
that he died in the year 1833 - leaving a widow

a widow ever since the death of the said Henry Worble

This affiant will further state that to the best of his  
knowledge and belief he is now about forty eight  
years of age that his father and mother the said  
Henry Worble and wife had one child which was  
born before this affidavit was given - this affiant will  
further state that he always understood from his

father and mother that they were married in  
or near Lexington Fayette county state of Kentucky

this affiant will state that the name of the family has  
been written by some Warble and by others called Worble  
that he is informed and believes that his fathers  
name was on the rolls as Worble and that he  
the said Henry Worble was so called by the  
department when the certificate

On this 29<sup>th</sup> day  
of September 1838 personally appeared before  
William Force - a Justice of the peace in and for  
Oldham County Kentucky Margaret Wirble a resident  
of Kentucky in the county of Oldham aged seventy  
years and upwards who being first duly sworn  
according to law - doth in her oath make the follow-  
ing declaration in order to obtain the benefit of the  
provision made by the act of Congress passed 7<sup>th</sup>  
July 1838 entitled an act granting half pay  
and pensions to certain widows.

That she is the  
widow of Henry Wirble who was a pensioner of  
the United States under the act of Congress of August  
- ten hundred and twenty eight as will more fully  
appear by reference to the records of the War  
Department - this declarant will state that she  
has not at this time any of the original papers  
upon which her husband drew his money that  
they have been lost or mislaid - that her late  
husband the said Henry Wirble was living  
in Oldham county Kentucky at the time he was  
allowed a pension - and continued to live

in said county until his death

She further declares

that she was married to the said Henry Wirble in Kentucky, in what is now called Fayette county, in the year seventeen hundred and eighty eight and that her husband the aforesaid Henry Wirble died on the day of April in the year eighteen hundred and thirty three; that she was not married to him prior to his leaving the service, but the marriage took place previous to the first of January seventeen hundred and ninety four viz at the time above stated

She would further state

that she is at this time unable to attend in person to make her declaration by reason of old age and infirmity of body, that the amount which her husband drew will be of great use to her in her old age

For the purpose of obtaining the benefits of the act  
entitled an act for the Relief of Certain Surviving  
Officers and Soldiers of the Army of the Revolution  
approved on the 15<sup>th</sup> day of May 1828 I Henry Wirble  
of the County of Oldham in the State of Kentucky do  
hereby declare that I enlisted in the Continental line  
of the Army of the Revolution for and during the war  
and continued in its service until its termination at  
which period I was a Private in Captain Bettes or  
Zelley's Company in Colonel Hazens Regiment called  
the Congress Regiment and also declare that I afterwards  
received Certificates for the Award of eighty dollars  
to which I was entitled under a Resolve of Congress  
Passed the 15<sup>th</sup> May 1828. And I further declare that I was  
not on the 15<sup>th</sup> of May 1828 on the Pension list of the  
United States. Witness my hand this 26<sup>th</sup> day of June 1828

I do further Certify that in the year 1804  
I sent by General Thomas Sandford my discharge  
to the War Office General Sandford was then in  
Congress from the State of Kentucky and took my  
discharge to obtain my Land Warrant he was  
afterwards drowned from which Circumstances  
I never got my discharge

Before me Edward M. Taylor a Justice of the  
Peace duly empowered to administer Oaths in the County  
of Oldham and State of Kentucky Personally appeared  
this day the foregoing subscribing Witnesses John  
Stephens and Oliver Lowder of the said County  
who did severally make Oath that Henry Wirble  
by whom the foregoing declaration was subscribed is  
generally reputed and believed to have been a Soldier  
in the Army of the Revolution in manner therein stated  
Witness that they have lived his Neighbour for upwards  
of twenty years. Witness my hand this 26<sup>th</sup> day of June  
1828
