State of Kentucky } November 17th 1840

on this day Personally appeared before me a Justice of the peace in and for the County aforesaid Elnora Rebecca of the County of Pendleton and State of Kentucky aged Eightyfour years the Ninth of June last who being first duly sworn according to Law doth or her oath make the following Declaration in order to obtain the benefit of the provision made by the act of Congress passed July the 4th 1836 that she is the widow of the late Solomon Biles who was a Soldier on the Virginia line and a pensioner under under the Law of 1818 all of which will more fully appear from his papers on file she further declares that they had a family Record of her marriage and the ages of her Children which was lost on their way from Virginia to Kentucky and the way she is enabled to for the date of her Marriage possibly is that it was on her birth day when she was twentytwo years of age and her son Elijah was borne on her birth day when she was twentythree years of age and was ~~twentythree~~ years of age on the Ninth day of June last she Refers to the Record of Orange County Virginia for evidence of her marriage and the foregoing Affidavit Her Husband was in the Service

after her marriage at the bar in under Col
and Capt — — From her great age and loss of
memory she is unable to state the names of the officers
under whom he served and that she was married to
the said Solomon Bellew in Orange County State of
Virginia on the ninth of June Seventeen hundred
and seventy eight and that her husband Solomon
Bellew died on the sixteenth day of September Eighteen
hundred and eighteen and that she has remained
a widow ever since that period as will more
fully appear by reference to the proof hereunto

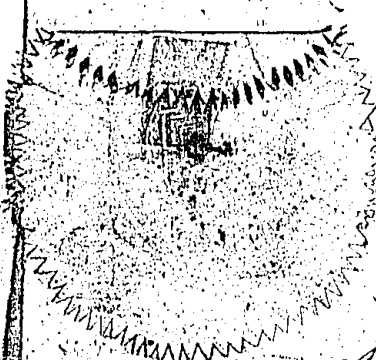
On this 26th of May 1818 before me
the Subscriber, one of the Circuit Judges for the County
aforesaid, personally appeared Solomon Belue aged 62
years resident in Pendleton County and State aforesaid - who
being by me first duly sworn according to Law doth
swear on his oath make the following declaration
in order to obtain the provisions made by the late act
of Congress entitled an act to provide for certain persons
engaged in the Land and Naval Services of the United
States in the Revolutionary war, that he the said
Solomon Belue that he entered the Service of the
United States for the term of one year in the regular
Service in the Company commanded by Capt. Francis
Daylor of the State of Virginia in Genl. Woodford's
Regiment in the year 1778 - he served the Army
at Valley Forge in the Spring of 1778 and served out
his said term of one year and was honorably discharged
at Nolan's Ferry in Virginia that he acted as
a waggoner by order of his officers at the battle of
Monmouth - that he is in reduced circumstances and
stands in need of the assistance of his country for support
and that he has no other evidence now in his power
save what he now produces of his said Services

I swore to and declared before me this day
and year aforesaid.

Dear Madam:

Reference is made to your letter in which you request the record of one Solomon Poloy (Polow), a Revolutionary War pensioner of Kentucky.

The military record and all family data on file in regard to that soldier follow.

The data contained herein was obtained from the papers on file in pension claim, V. 6288, based upon the military service of Solomon Poloy. The name does not appear as Polow.

Solomon Poloy, while a resident of Orange County, Virginia, enlisted in 1778, served in Captain Frank Taylor's Virginia Company, was a witness at the battle of Brandywine, and was discharged at the expiration of service of two years.

Pension was allowed on his application presented May 23, 1818, at which time he was a resident of Pendleton County, Kentucky, aged sixty-two or sixty-three years.

Soldier died September 15, 1818 in Pendleton County, Kentucky.

Solomon Poloy married June 9, 1778, in Orange County, Virginia. His wife's name is not stated. She was born June 9, 1761. They were married at the home of Colonel Robert Johnson, where they then resided.

Marie Poloy was allowed pension on her application presented November 17, 1830, at which time she was a resident of Pendleton County, Kentucky.

William and Eliza had children, as before given except
Wm. of Eliza, their first son, who was born June 9, 1872. He
was living in 1940, residence not stated.
