Declaration

In order to obtain the benefit of the act of Congress
passed June 7th 1832

State of Kentucky
Pondletown County

On the 7th day of October AD 1833, personal
appeared in open court before the Pondletown County Court at
that afore. Declared term before James L. Leonard, for Justice
John Harton Justice sitting thereof, Samuel H. Cameron
a resident of the County aforesaid, aged seventy two years, who, being first
duly sworn, according to law, states on his oath make the following
Declaration in order to obtain the benefit of the act of Congress
passed June the 7th AD 1832

That he was born as he believes, and always has understood from
his parents to believe, on the 14th day of November AD 1760, at Fort
Shiglers, in the County of Northumberland State of Pennsylvania
that he knows of no record of the time and place of his birth, and
believes there is none now in existence, if there is, he knows
not where, or in whose possession

That during the the battle of Brandywine (the present year being
to his age and the lapse of time, and probably to the want of
being fitted with an education or learning sufficient to enable
him to write his name, or read with facility) he cannot
remember further than that it was, in that year, in which Fort
Mifflin in Northumberland County Pennsylvania, was attacked by
the Indians and shortly before that event he took the County
entered the service, as enlisted, that he received the County
and was enlisted by a Capt. William M. Gray as a common
7 Soldier, for the term of seven months against the British
and Indians, that he served the seven months, and while out
was commanded by said Capt. William M. Gray, and Lieut
John M. Mearns, the former a citizen of Cumberland
County Pa. the said officers together with other inferior
and superior Officers commanded the said party - That
the superior or general officer who commanded the
expedition, in which he enlisted and served and the troops

to which, he was attached, were Gen James Follen and Col John Kelly, of the said State, and altho he was in active service for and during the term of seven months, protecting, the, their, frontiers in that section of the Country, from invasion and the depredations of the enemy, he was not engaged in any actual battle, and the nearest he ever came, during his said service to an actual engagement, was, being drawn up, twice in line of battle, with the confident expectation of a ~~momentary~~ approach and attack of the enemy - And that his service, together with that of his companions in arms, consisted in marching from point to point on the frontiers, entering, what was then, the enemies country, in pursuit of them, guarding the several frontier posts and protecting and defending the bordering settlements -

That he resided at the time of entering the services of his country in Northumberland County Pa: and was intitled into the same as before stated by Capt. Williams of the Coy, that he served during the entire term of seven months, and at the termination thereof, received a written discharge from his said Capt., that the number or name of the Regiment to which his company belonged, he does not and cannot recollect: that from his birth up to the year 1793 - he resided in Northumberland and Cumberland Counties Pa, and following the year last aforesaid emigrated to this State (Kentucky); and that when he removed from his native State and County, he left his written discharge (then deemed of little value) among some waste or to him useless papers, and a portion of continental paper money received for services, in Northumberland County, in the possession of ~~John Kelly~~ John Kelly or a certain Mr Martin which of the two is not certainly recollectd. And that he has not heard of or seen his discharge since, and knows not whether Kelly or Martin is dead or alive, but presumes them both, from their then age long since dead, and his written discharge long since lost or destroyed - And being, if in existence, he knows not, how, or where to

to find it, And that on account of his infirm age, ~~and the want of the means, waving all other obstacles and contingencies arising from the lapse of time;~~ the mutilation of population, the inevitable effects of death, &c, and the increase of difficulties that would present themselves to him; now as changed, and an almost entire new born population in Northumberland he has no hesitation in saying, that the discharge, now, is, for ever beyond his reach and that he now is unable to procure it.

He further states that he also served in the militia of the State of Pennsylvania, as a common soldier, during the ~~Revolutionary war~~, in protecting the frontiers of S. State for short intervals of short terms of time, at other and different services as a soldier in the militia, tho at no other time, was enlisted by taking the bounty, or mustered regularly into the service; or entered upon actual service for a different time or fixed term, until the commencement of the aforesaid seven months term or terms. And that these irregular services were induced by the difficulties and emergencies of the times, in bodies more or less constituted irregularly into military array or force.

He further states that owing to the length of time, since the services were performed, the few survivors of those times now of whom and known to him remaining, the long period that has elapsed since his emigration, and the great distance he now resides from the country, within which the scenes of his services transpired; and within which and if possibly in ~~any~~ (in ~~any~~ yet) the written or other evidences of those services and also probably the surviving few witnesses thereof - he has no documentary evidence within his possession, reach or knowledge; and knows of no person within this State or his reach, living, ~~whom testimony might be procured~~ which would prove, or who can testify to them. He presumes there is a brother of his, who long since emigrated to the State of Virginia, living, but whether dead or alive, or where, what particular part

he having ~~been~~ to or now lives, he has been unable to find out if ~~that~~ brother is still alive, he ^{knows of his services} and by him he could prove his services - but not knowing ~~that~~ whether alive or dead or where to find him, he now knows of no persons living as before stated by whom he could prove his services -

He furthermore hereby relinquishes every claim, whatsoever to a pension or an annuity, except the present, and his heirs, that his name is on the pension Roll of any Agency in any State - Sworn to & subscribed this 8th day of year aforesaid. James H. [Signature]

We Jesse Robinson Blagynow residing in the County of Grant and John Childers - residing in the County of Pendleton by and within the vicinity of the aforesaid James H. Hammarly hereby testify, that we are well acquainted with said Hammarly who has subscribed and sworn to the above Declaration. There we believe him to be about seventy two years of age. That he is reputed and believed in the neigh hood, where he resides to have been a soldier of the revolution. and that we concur in that opinion. Sworn & subscribed the day & year aforesaid.

On this the 24th day of August 1849 personally appeared before me, a justice of the Peace in and for the County and State aforesaid Judith Hammondy, a resident of Pendleton County and State of Kentucky, who by reason of bodily infirmity is unable to appear in a Court of records, being sworn according to law, doth make the following declaration in order to obtain a pension under a law of Congress passed day of _____ in the year: that she is the widow of James Hammondy, who was a private soldier in the army of the Revolution; that she is unable to state the day or month year when he entered the service or the time when he left the same; that she does not know the names of the officers under whom he served, nor whether he was in any battle and that the said James Hammondy was as a pensioner, under the act of Congress passed the day of June 1832, to whom a certificate of pension was granted by the War Department of the Government in the following figures and words:

War Department - Revolutionary claim.

I certify, that in conformity with the law of the United States of the 7th of June 1832, James Hammondy of the State of Kentucky, who was a private in the Army of the Revolution, is entitled to receive \$23.⁰⁰ per annum during his natural life, commencing on the 4th day of March 1831 & payable semi-annually, on the 4th of March & 4th of September in every year.

Hammerby aged about Ninety years, a resident
of the County of Pendleton & State of Kentucky
who being duly sworn according to law, declares
that she is the widow of Dandy Hammerby deceased
who was a private in the Revolutionary war, & also
a pensioner for service in said war; she also declares
that she is now a revolutionary pensioner, that she
was married to the said Dandy Hammerby in the
or about the year 1796 that her maiden name was Duddle

that her said husband died in the
year 1843 and that she is now a widow - for
the proof of service marriage &c she refers to her
application for pension & also to the application of
her husband for pension, now on file at the apt -
she makes this declaration for the purpose of ob-
taining the bounty land to which she may be
entitled under the act passed & approved the 3rd
day of March A. D. 1855. - She also declares that
she is the identical person named in an original
certificate now in our possession which reads as follows

Department of the Interior
Widow's Pension

I certify that in conformity with the act of July
29, 1848 Duane Hammerby, widow of Dandy
Hammerby, who was a private in the Revolutionary
war is inscribed on the pension list, at the rate of
Twenty Three Dollars & thirty three cents per annum
commencing on the 4th of March 1848 & continuing
for life, unless she should again marry in which
case the pension is not payable after the time of

such marriage
