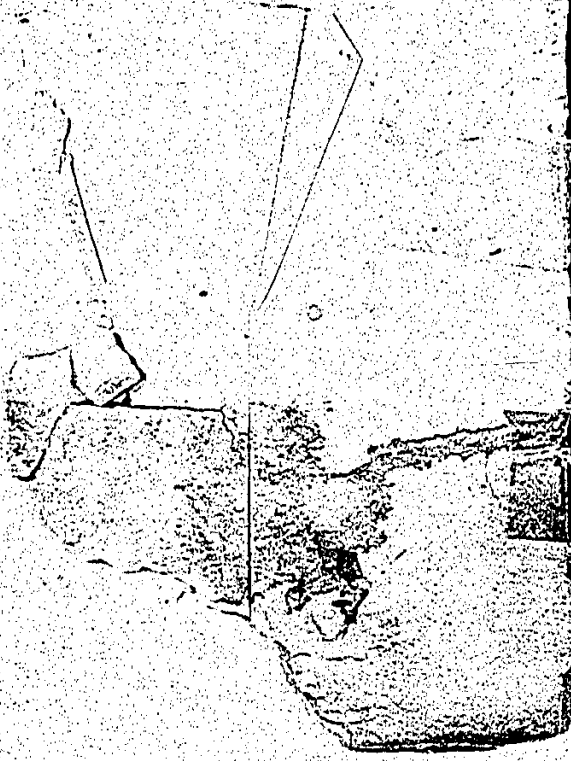

Pendleton County June Term

On this the 15th day of June 1818 before
the County Court for the County of Pendleton
personally appeared John Montgoy Senr aged 45 years
Resident in Pendleton County and State of
who being first duly sworn according to
Law doth on his oath make the following
Declaration in order to obtain the proceeds
of an Act made by an Act of Congress in
titled ~~as~~ an Act to provide for certain
persons engaged in the land and Naval Survey
of the United States in the revolutionary war

That he the said John Montgoy entered into
the Continental Service as a Captain in the
10th Virginia Regiment Commanded by Col
Edward Stephens and in September 1777 on
the 14th day of January 1777 and in Sept 1778
was returned a Dispersing and returned home
until wanted that he had received his ^{Appointment} Commission
in Oct previous to the date of his joining the Regiment
and was employed until the 14th January in
Recreating the Regiment - which was recruited for
3 years and that he has received his bounty
lands and he ~~thinks~~ ^{thinks} his Commission is now
in his Possession which is Shewn

and that from his age and reduced Circum-
stances he stands in need of the assistance
of his Country for support.

John Montgoy

The deposition of Reuben McCarty and others
taken in Shelburne, Pendleton County, Ky on the
2^d day of July 1879, to prove the place of res-
idence and time of death of Capt. John Mount-
joy, and also when he received a pension
as a revolutionary soldier and officer, from the
U.S. government.

The deponent Reuben McCarty is of
lawful age and duly sworn deponent
and death, or circumstances the following inter-
rogatory viz. When did Capt. J. Mountjoy die?
When did he receive a pension? and where
and where did he die?

Captain John Mountjoy resided in Pendleton
County, State of Kentucky, at the time of his death
which took place some time about the latter of
February or first of March in the year 1822.
Whether Captain John Mountjoy ever received
a pension or not, this deponent is not informed.
But from a long and intimate acquai-
ntance with Captain John Mountjoy up to the
time of his death I learned with the surviving
children he is of opinion that he the said
Captain John Mountjoy had claims against
the General Government for military services
performed during the Revolutionary War.
Settled & due him at the time of his
death. If so this deponent saith and
R. McCarty

Samuel Thos. Houser also of lawful age and
sworn deponent and duly sworn deponent
and death. That he personally knew
Capt John Mountjoy for some years anterior

to his death and up to his death, that
the year in which he died he does not
specifically recollect, tho' he proposes and
believes it is correctly stated in the above
deposition. Since his death, by ~~following~~ being
and other wise, he has become familiarly
acquainted with his children, and from
general reputation, from the family, ~~and~~
~~through~~ neighbors and others, he is satisfied
that John Brewington between 1818 and
his death he was, for some extent of
time a prisoner while residing in this
County and some years before his death
which occurred in this County a prisoner
of the State, for revolutionary services
and by universal reputation, ~~was~~ as
well as his brother Allen Brewington who
also died in this County, a revolutionary
soldier.
