On this 15th day of June 1878 before the County
Court of Pendleton County personally appeared
William Whartons aged 74 years and upwards
Resident in Pendleton County and State of
who being by the Court first duly sworn
according to Law. Doth say he doth make
the following Declaration in order to obtain
the provision made by an act of Congress
entitled an act to ~~provide~~ for certain Persons
engaged in the Land and Naval Service of the
United States in the revolutionary War -

That he the said William Whartons entered
in the Service of the United States at Legation
in Pennsylvania under Capt Samuel Miller
of the 18th Pennsylvania Regiment Commanded
Lt. Coy (who soon afterwards died and was
succeeded by Col. Broadheads) of the Continental
line as a private for the term of three
years which time he served out ~~and returned~~
and afterwards was enlisted again during
the war at Pittsburg Garrison by Capt
Clarke of the same Company who succeeded
to the Command of the Company after Capt
Miller was killed by the Indians and which
time he served out to wit to the end of the
war and was discharged but never applied to
any Officer of the Army for a discharge Therefore
has none the transfer nor has he ever obtained
any Bounty lands that he was in the whole

About 4 years in the service and engaged
mostly in duty on the Western Waters. He
does not remember the year he entered he
states that it was early in the beginning of
the War and a month the first Regiment of the
5th Pennsylvania Regiment he thinks about 8 or 9
of June

and that he is in reduced circumstances
and needs the assistance of his country
for support

On this 21st day of August 1820 personally appeared in open Court being a Court of record for said County being expressly made a Court of record by the laws of the State of Kentucky and County of Grant William Whadlow aged seventy three years on the 1st day of March last Resident in the County and District aforesaid who being first duly sworn according to Law both on his oath declare that he served in the Revolutionary War as follows - he enlisted in the regular service on the 1st of Sept. 1774 for the term of three years in the company of Captain Samuel Miller attached to the 8th Pennsylvania Reg^t commanded by Col. McCoy in Cumberland County Pennsylvania that he was in the Battle on the Western Water the plan which was entitled to serve at - in 1777 then commanded by Captain Brady & Clark on receding waters on 3rd Water in September skirmishes ~~with~~ that date not recollects and continued so until discharged that the Western Water being Head Quarter for Col. McCoy's army at that time ~~that~~ agreeable to an original declaration dated 28th day of February 1789 and a pension certificate now in his possession No. 9563 and I do solemnly swear that I was a Resident Citizen of the United States on the 18th day of March 1818 and that I have not since that time by gift sale or in any manner disposed of my property or any part thereof with intent thereby to diminish it or to bring myself within the provisions of an Act of Congress entitled an Act to provide for certain persons engaged in the Land & Naval services of the United States and in the Revolutionary War ~~that~~ on the 18th day of

of March 1818. and that I have not nor
has any person for me, in trust any property
or securities, bonds or debts due to me
nor have I any income other than what
is contained in the schedule hereto annexed
and by me subscribed viz
one horse value \$45

one note not due - 15

\$60

Warranted to clear persons
in the sum of \$44

He further states that he is a roamer but very
regular and totally incapable of pursuing it
viz. himself and grand daughter Agnes
born aged sixteen years respectively
