X State of Kentucky Warren County etc

On this 24<sup>th</sup> day of June 1833 personally appeared  
in open court before the county court of  
said county now sitting Phineas Case aged 69  
years a resident of the county and state of aged  
69 years who being first duly sworn according  
to law doth on his oath make the following  
Declarations in order to obtain the benefit of  
the act of Congress passed June 9<sup>th</sup> 1832  
That he entered the service of the United States  
under the following named officers and served as  
herein stated - That he was born on the 10<sup>th</sup> day of  
the year 1764 in the county of Halifax Virginia  
That about the 5<sup>th</sup> day of March <sup>will as</sup> he can recol-  
lect ~~he entered~~ in the year 1799 he enlisted in the  
army of the United States under Capt James Shelly  
and served under ~~Capt~~ Shelly as Capt &  
under Richard Brasher as Lieutenant and Garrett  
Williams Williams as Ensigne and John Montgomery  
as Capt who was under the command of Genl  
Rogers Clark in the line of the State of Va. he resided  
at the time of his enlistment in the county of Henry  
Va, and went on a visit to Watston River where  
he enlisted at the Long Islands - at that place he  
took water descended the Tennessee River - down  
that to the Ohio - down the Ohio to the Mississippi  
River and up that River to the Kaskaskia River  
and up that river to miles to the Illinois Savans as  
then called, continued there about 30 days then he  
went with the troops in Boats down to the Ohio  
River and up the ~~river~~ <sup>same</sup> to the mouth of the Great  
Wabash and up that River to where Post Vincent  
is now situated, which was called then a Post  
where he remained all the summer of 1799 except  
about one month when he went further up the War  
back against the Indians, he states that he remained  
at there (a Post) during the fall and winter of id  
year, and for guarding pack horses was promised  
one dollar per day for 90 days but never received  
a cent for that nor for any of his services during the

Resolutions. In March 1780 he was sent on a express  
by Col John Montgomery to the Illinois Territory  
where he remained till he was discharged  
by Col Montgomery in June 1780. He entered for  
the term of one year but was detained more than  
15 months before he was discharged. he states that  
about twelve years after this he was discharged  
Col Montgomery called at his house where he now  
lives and got his discharge from him for the  
purpose of getting the pay and land that were  
promised him. ~~Montgomery~~ was shortly after  
~~called~~ <sup>by the Indians</sup> killed he could never proceed his dis-  
charge again nor land <sup>or</sup> pay; after he received  
his discharge ~~assurances~~ in 1780 he volunteered  
at the Illinois town on the 1st of July 1798 and  
served for 60 or 65 days and served under Col  
Montgomery; he went up the Mississippi to the  
mouth of Illinois river thence up to river  
to a little French village, there they left the Boats  
and with Packhorses went to River river against  
the Indians - but they had all fled they returned  
to the Boats - he states that during part of this time  
for want of provision they were compelled part  
of the time to subsist on a dead horse. for this  
time he got only a verbal discharge from  
Montgomery at what is now called St Louis  
He states that he cannot say precisely how long  
he served but he knows that he will be safe in  
making oath that he did not serve a shorter  
period than seventeen months - His age was record-  
ed in his fathers Bible in the State of Virginia he lived  
in Henry County Va when he entered the Army  
immediately after <sup>the Revolutionary</sup> War he moved to Davidson County  
Tennessee - from thence to Warren County Va  
where he has resided ever since he knows of  
no documentary evidence of his services nor any  
person by whom he could prove his services  
except one Saml McGowan whose affidavit  
he has procured he was in no battle the officers

he knew in the Revolution except those already  
named were Capt. Thomas Quirk - Capt.

Taylor. Capt. James Capt. Todd

The following are the names of the some of the  
persons living in his neighborhood who can tes-  
tify to his Character for veracity and their be-  
lieve as to his services in the Revolution  
Capt. John Stone. Capt. Joseph Conington  
General Elyah Conington Col Wm Marshall

ber the number of the Regiment in which he served

State of Kentucky Warren County Set  
This day Barbary Cox, widow & relict of  
Phineas Cox Dead late a pensioner of the United  
States on the Roll of the Kentucky Agency as  
appears from the certificate of Lewis Capps Secretary  
of War dated 28 Jan'y 1834, personally came  
into the Warren County Court - being a court  
of record for the State aforesaid & for the purpose  
of availing herself of the pension laws of the  
United States applicable to her case did in  
open Court - being first duly sworn, depose  
& declare that she is the widow & relict of  
the said Phineas Cox, that she & the said  
Phineas were married at a very early time  
to wit before the close of the Revolutionary War  
in what is now ~~Washington~~<sup>Jefferson</sup> County in the State  
of Tennessee & that she remained the wife  
of said Phineas from the time of their marriage  
up to the time of his death & raised by  
him a family of twelve children the eldest  
of whom is now fifty nine years of age. The  
said Barbary states that she is now eighty  
years of age that she does not believe there  
were any records of her marriage preserved  
as it took place in Tennessee before

There was some regular government and  
when the people the few that were there lived  
in forts. She refers to the declaration of her  
said husband on file in the War Department  
for the nature & character of his services  
rendered in the Revolutionary War & for  
which the pension was granted him & she  
makes his pension certificate a part of  
this her declaration. She states that her  
said husband died in this County on  
the 18<sup>th</sup> day of May 1842 & that he  
had lived in this County many years be-  
fore his death & had represented it in the  
Legislature of this State. She states that  
she is now domiciled in the County of  
Warren & State of Kentucky & expects  
to spend the remainder of her life in it.  
She therefore prays that this her declaration  
signed by her hand on this 27<sup>th</sup> day of  
November 1843, with her proof in support  
thereof, may be certified under the seal  
of the Court to the War Department

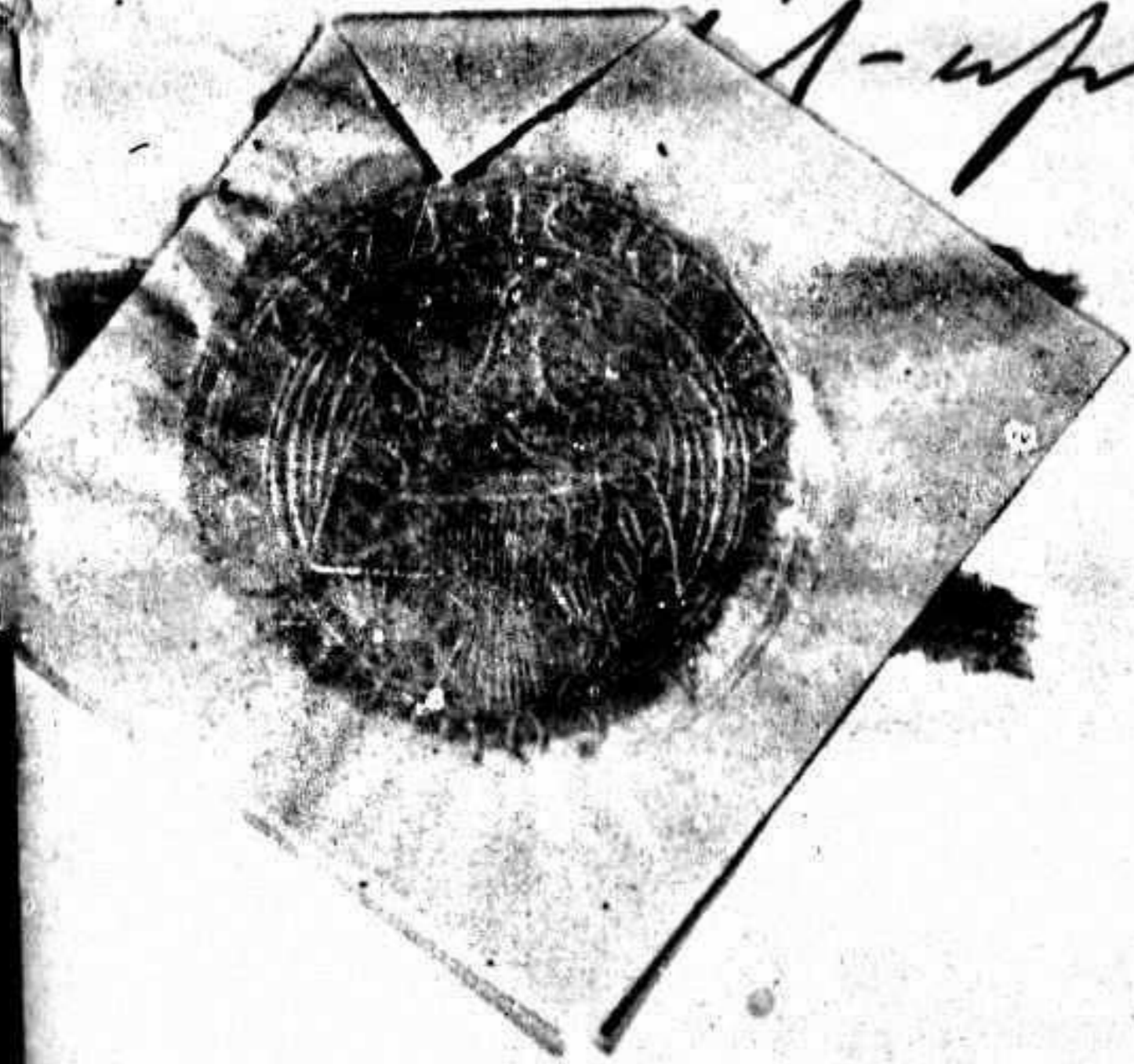

them as his parents. He was raised by them as  
their child & has been advanced in life as such  
that he is now in the fifty fifth year of his age  
according to the information he has received  
& verily believes that his said father & mother  
raised <sup>Twelve</sup> children of whom <sup>William M.</sup> ~~the eldest~~  
Cox the eldest is now in the ~~forty~~ <sup>thirty</sup> year  
of his age as this affiant is informed & verily be-  
lieves that his said father & mother lived toge-  
ther as man & wife from his earliest recollection  
to the 18<sup>th</sup> day of May 1842 when his father

In June 1833 of Warren Co Ky aged 69 years born Oct 10 1764 in Halifax Co Va  
In March 1779 he <sup>for one year</sup> enlisted while living in Henry Co Va under Capt James Shelby &  
Colo John Montgomery in Gen Geo R Clark's Command & went on a Vint to Holston river  
where he enlisted at Long Island from whence he descended by water the Ten<sup>nessee</sup> river  
to the Ohio river, then to the Mississippi river & up that river to Kas Kaska river then up  
that river border to the Illinois town where he continued about 30 days from there  
in boats down to the Ohio & up to the great Wabash to <sup>where</sup> Post Vincent is now located  
which was then called O. Post where he remained thro the Summer of 1779  
except about a month when he further up the Wabash against the Indians, & also  
remained there during the fall & winter, guarding pack houses about 90 days  
In March 1780 he was sent by Colo John Montgomery to the Ill<sup>inois</sup>  
town where he remained until discharged in June 1780 Called at his home  
12 year later, to whom he desired to get his pay but shortly after Colo Montgomery  
was killed by the Indians & he did not get discharged again  
In July 1780 he Vol<sup>unteered</sup> in the Ill<sup>inois</sup> town for 2 mos with Colo Montgomery going

with the Mep'ke to the mouth of Delo river, up which they went to a little  
French Village where they left the boats & went with pack horses to Fever or Fever  
River against the Indians but the latter had fled they returned to the boats  
During part of the tour for want of provisions were compelled to subsist on a dead  
horse

Immediately after the war he moved from Va to Davidson Co Tenn  
from there to Warren Co Ky where residing ever since

He mar<sup>d</sup> in Davidson Co Tenn to Barbara <sup>she had 12 children</sup>  
<sup>Robert M. Cox</sup> <sup>another son Fredrick of Warren Co</sup>  
oldest born about 1784 - He died in Warren Co May 18. 1842 leaving a widow  
He represented in the Legislature of Ky. Widow alive in 1848 aged 87 years

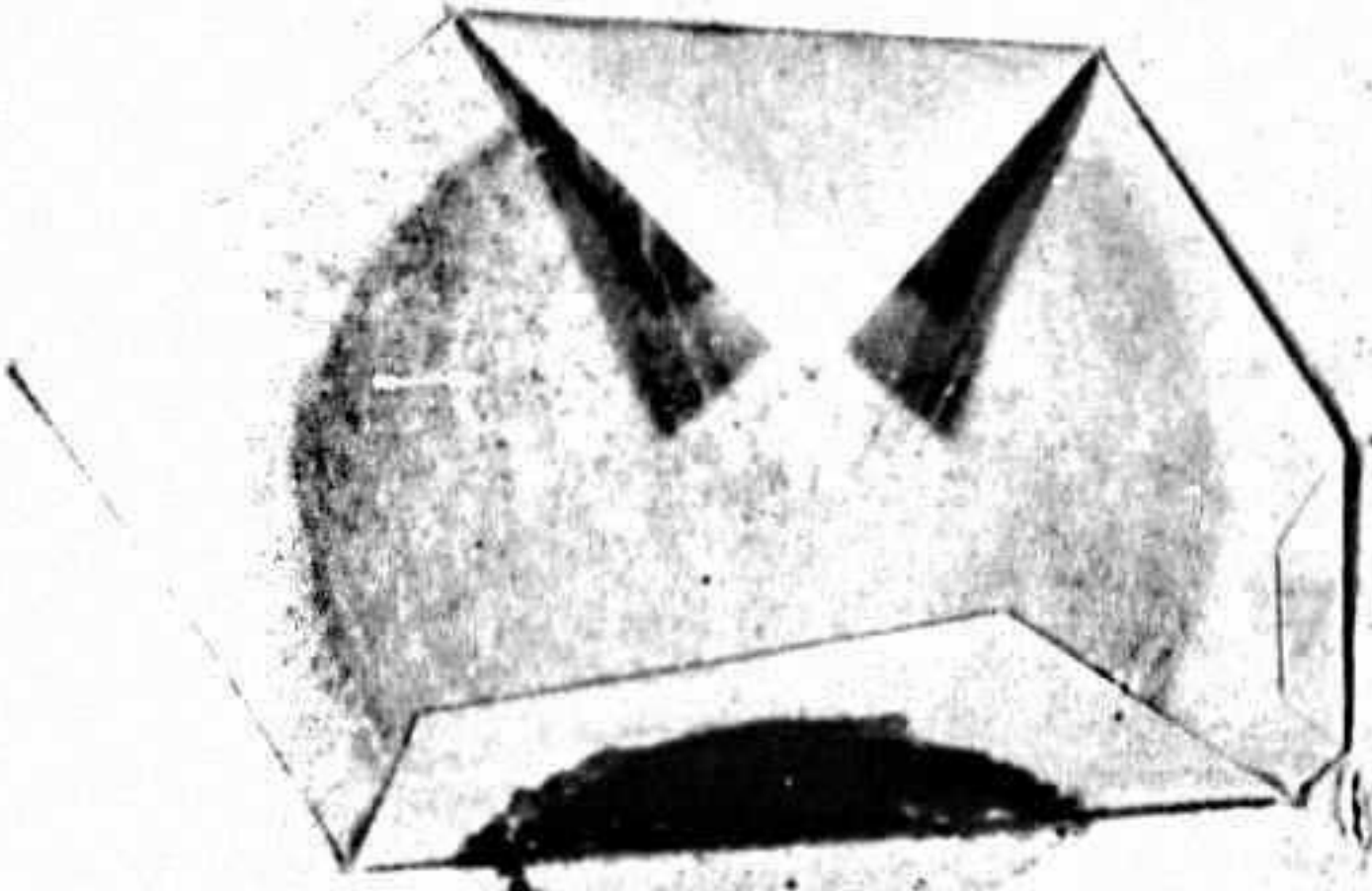

I certify that, in conformity with the law of the United States of the 7th June, 1832, Phineas Cox of the State of Kentucky who was a Private in the Army of the Revolution is entitled to receive fifty three dollars and thirty three cents per annum, during his natural life, commencing on the 4th of March, 1831, and payable semi-annually on the 4th of March, and 4th of September in every year.

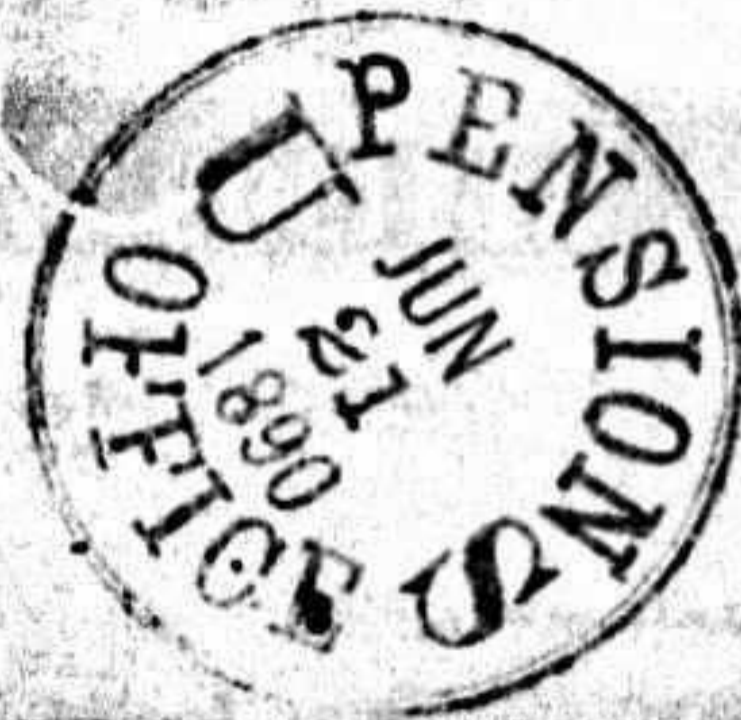
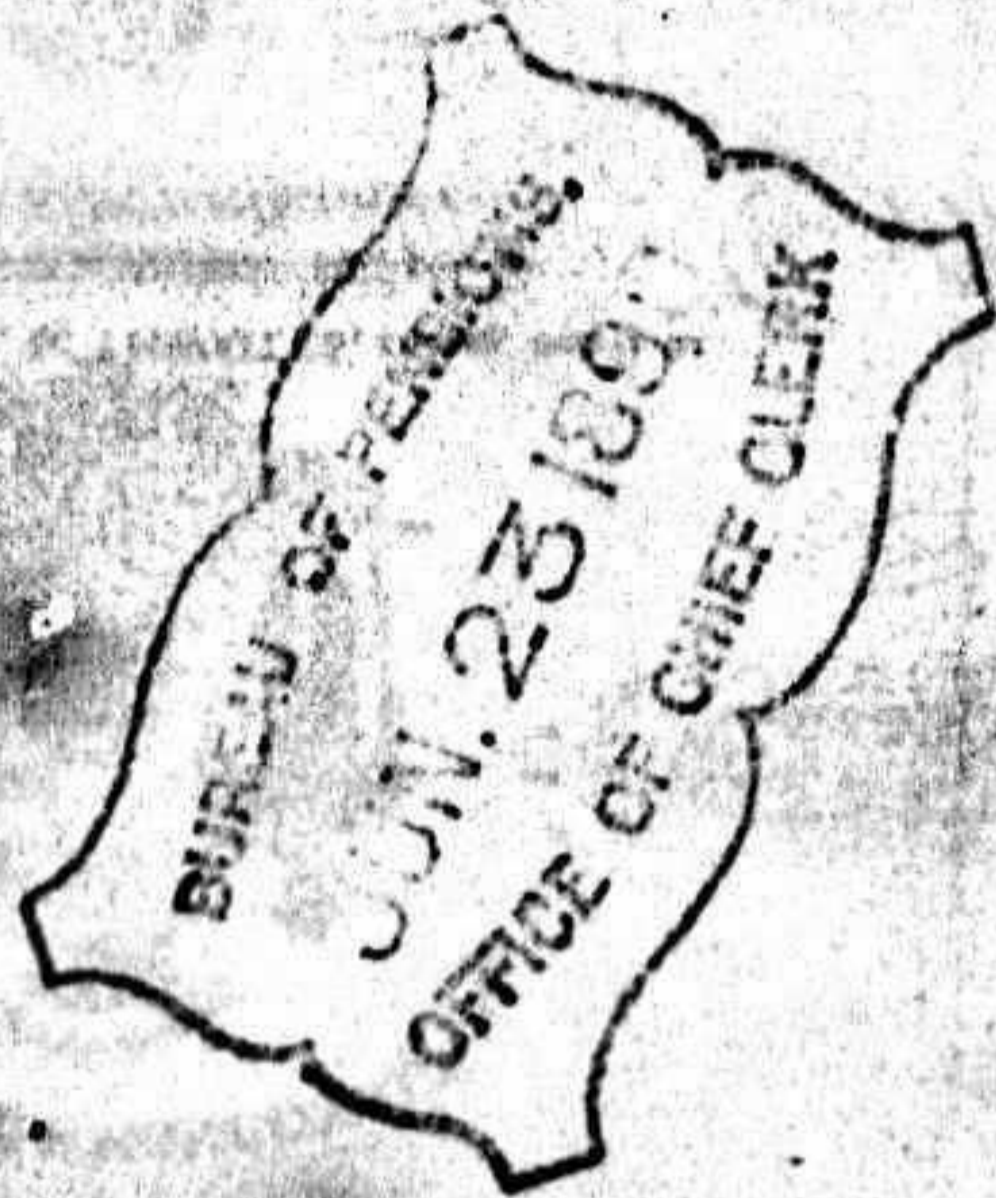

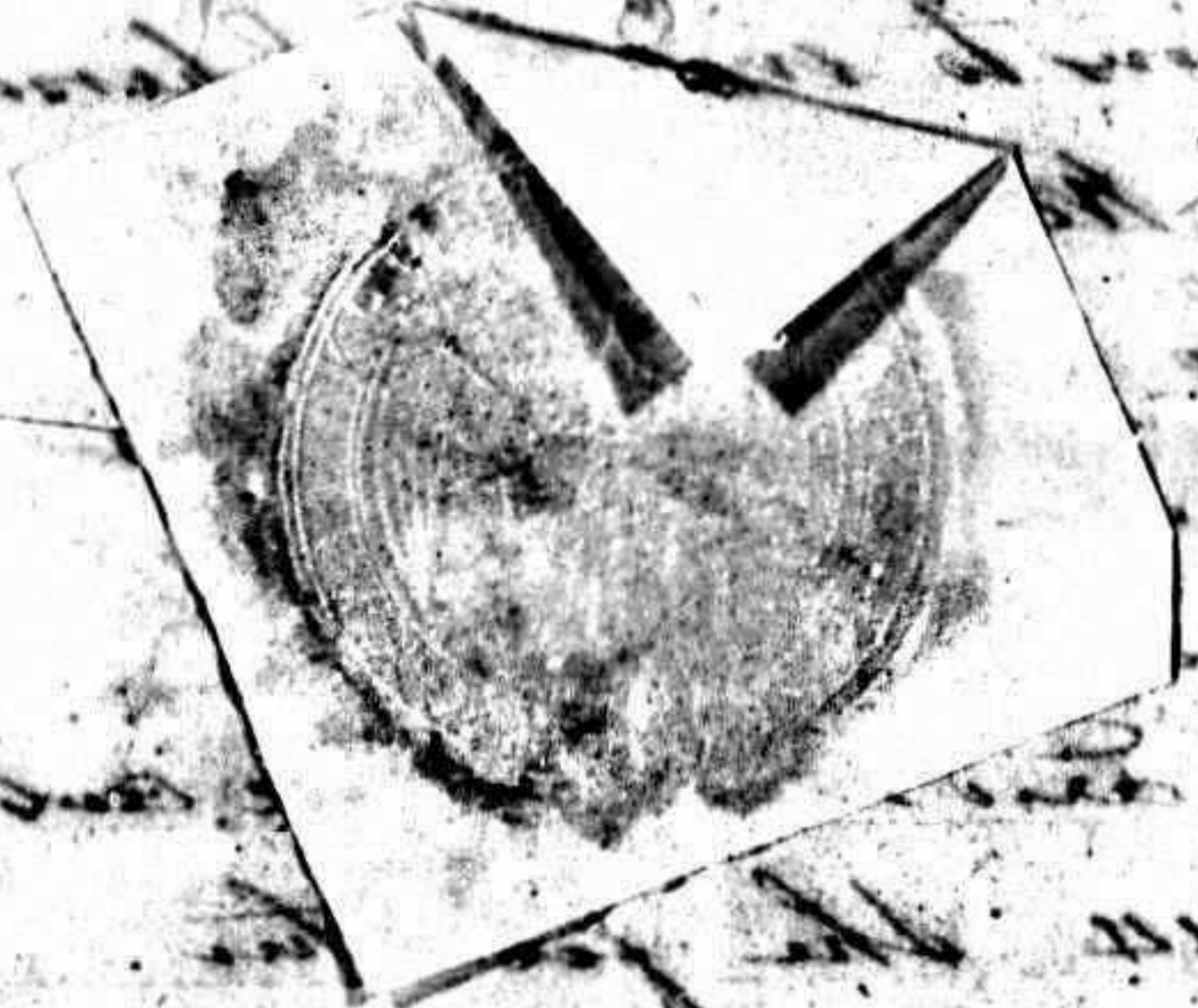
