



On this 24th day of June 1833 personally appeared in open Court before the County Court of said County now sitting Phineas Bass aged 67 years a resident of the County and State aforesaid 67 years who being first duly sworn according to law doth by his oath make the following Declaration in order to obtain the benefit of the Act of Congress passed June 3rd 1832.

That he entered the service of the United States under the following named officers and served as herein stated - That he was born on the 10th Oct in the year 1764 in the County of Galiford Virginia

That about the 5th day of March as far as he can recollect he enlisted in the year 1779 he enlisted in the army of the United States under Capt Davis Shelley and served under Capt ~~James~~ Shelley as Capt & under Richard Brasher as Lieutenant and Garrett Williams Williams as Ensign and John Montgomery as 1st Lt. who was under the command of Genl O'Gara Rogers Clark in the time of the State of Virg he resided at the time of his enlistment in the County of Henry Virg and went on a visit to Wabash River where he enlisted at the Loring Islands - at that place he took water descended the Tennessee River down that to the Ohio down the Ohio to the Mississippi River and up that River to the Raskaska River and up that river 6 miles to the Illinois River as then called contained there about 30 days then he went with the troops in Boats down to the Ohio River and up the ~~some~~ to the mouth of the great Wabash and up that River to where Post Vincent is now situated which was called then & Post where he remained all the summer of 1779 except about one month when he went further up the Wabash against the Indians he states that he remained at there (Post) during the fall and winter of said year and for guarding Packhorses was promised one dollar per day for 90 days but never received a cent for that nor for any of his services during the

~~Resurrection~~. In March 1780 he was sent on express
by Col ^{of Post} John Montgomery to the Illinois Towns
where he remained till he was discharged
by Col Montgomery in June 1780. He entreated for
the term of one year but was detained more than
15 months before he was discharged. he states that
about twelve years after this he was discharged
Col Montgomery called at his house where he now
lives and got his discharge from him for the
purpose of getting the pay and land that were
promised him. Montgomery was shortly after
~~killed~~ killed by the Indians and never received his dis-
charge again nor land or pay; after he received
his discharge ~~as far as~~ in 1780 he volunteered
at the Illinois towns on the 1st of July 1790 and
served for 60 or 65 days and served under Col
Montgomery; he went up the Mississippi to the
mouths of Illinois river three up the river
to a little French village there they left the boats
and with pack horses went to ^{the} river against
the Indians - but they had all fled they returned
to the boats - he states that during part of this tour
for want of provision they were compelled part
of the time to subsist on a dead horse. for this
time he got only a verbal discharge from
Montgomery at what is now called St Louis
He states that he cannot say precisely how long
he served but he knows that he will be safe in
making any oath that he did not serve a shorter
period than sixteen months His age was recorded
in his father's Bible in the State of Virginia. he lived
in Henry County Virginia when he entered the Army
immediately after ^{the Revolutionary} War he moved to Davidson County
Tennessee - from thence to Warren County ¹⁷⁸³
where he has resided ever since he knows of
no documentary evidence of his services. nor any
person by whom he could prove his services
except one Sam'l McGaugh whose affidavit
he has procured he was in no battle the officer

he knew in the Revolution except those already
named were Capt. Thomas Quirk - Capt.

Taylor - Capt. James Capt. Todd

The following are the names of the some of the

tify to his character for veracity and their testi-
ment to his services in the revolution

This day Barbary Cox, widow & relit of
Phineas Cox Dead late a pensioner of the United
States on the Roll of the Kentucky Agency as
appears from the certificate of Lewis Clegg Secretary
of War dated 28 June 1834, personally come
into the Warren County Court being a court
of record for the State aforesaid & for the purpose
of availing herself of the pension laws of the
United States applicable to her case did in
open Court being first duly sworn depose
& declare that she is the widow & relit of
the said Phineas Cox, that she & the said
Phineas were married at a very early time
prior to the close of the Revolutionary War
in what is now ~~Benton~~^{Washington} County in the State
of Tennessee & that she remained the wife
of said Phineas from the time of their marriage
up to the time of his death & raised by
him a family of twelve children the oldest
of whom is now fifty nine years of age. The
said Barbary states that she is now eighty
years of age that she does not believe there
were any records of her marriage preserved
as it took place in Tennessee before

There was much regular government and
when the people the few that were there lived
in forts. She refers to the declaration of her
said husband on file in the War Department
for the nature & character of his services
rendered in the Revolutionary War & for
which the pension was granted him & she
makes his pension certificate a part of
this her declaration. She states that her
said husband died in this County on
the 18th day of May 1842 & that he
had lived in this county many years be-
fore his death & had represented it in the
Legislature of this State. She states that
she is now domiciled in the County of
Warren & State of Kentucky & expects
to spend the remainder of her life in it.
She therefore says that this her declaration
signed by her hand on this 27th day of
November 1843, with her proofs in support
thereof, may be certified under the seal
of the County to the War Department

for forty two years during which time they lived
together as man & wife & were so reputed &
respected by their acquaintances. But they were
persons of respectability & good character & that
they were father & mother of many children.
This affiant stated that he knew ^{from information that} William
W. Cox ^{said to be the eldest} & the other children
of the said Phineas & Barbary & that said William
W. Cox was from his appearance about sixty
years of age. In witness whereof the said
Andrew Stagner hath hereunto subscribed his name this
27 day of November 1843

by them as their son & he knew no others but
them as his parents. He was raised by them as
their child & has been advanced in life as such
that he is now in the fifty fifth year of his age
according to the information he has received
& nearly believes that his said father & mother
raised twelve children of whom William W.
Cox the eldest is now in the ~~forty~~^{seventy} year
of his age as this affiant is informed & nearly be-
lieves that his said Father & Brother lived toge-
ther as man & wife from his earliest recollection
to the 18th day of May 1842 when his father
died in this county in which his mother now lives
& that he has no doubt but that his father &
mother were married in the Brown State &
Jemima as stated by her before there was
any regular Government organized there

In June 1833 of Warren Co Ky aged 69 years born Oct 10 1764 in Halifax Co Va
In March 1779 he enlisted ^{for one year} while living in Henry Co Va under Capt James Shelly & Col. John Montgomery in Gen Geo R Clark's command & went to Holston river where he enlisted at Long Island from whence he descended by water the Tennessee river to the Ohio river, then to the Mississippi river & up that river to Kaskaskia river then up that river border to the Illinois towns where he remained about 30 days from there in boats down to the Ohio & up to the great Wabash ^{where} Post Vincent is now located which was then called O. Post where he remained thro the summer of 1779 except about a month when he further up the Wabash against the Indians, & also remained there during the fall & winter, guarding pack horses about 90 days In March 1780 he was sent as spy from O. Post by Col. John Montgomery to Frenchtown where he remained until discharge in June 1780 Called at his home 12 years later, to whom he delivered to get his pay but shortly after Col. Montgomery was killed by the Indians & he did not get discharge again In July 1780 he was in the Ills towns for 2 mos with Col. Montgomery going

up the Mississipi to the mouth of Illinois river, up which they went to a little French Village where they left the boats & went with pack horses to Fever or Freezer against the Indians but the latter had fled they returned to the boats During part of the tour for want of provision were compelled to subsist on a dead horse Immediately after the war he moved from Vicksburg to Dardanelle Town from there to Warren Co Ky where rendering other service

He married in Dardanelle to Teney Co Barbara ^{had 12 children}
East Tennessee another son Frederick of Warren Co
oldest born about 1784 - He died in Warren Co May 18. 1842 leaving widow
He represented in the Legislature of Ky widow alive in 1848 aged 87 years






