Patrick O Linn's Schedule and Statement  
as a United States Pensioner was produced in Open  
Court and Subscribed by said Linn and Admitted to  
be testified at former times. On this the 10<sup>th</sup> day  
of July 1820 personally appeared before the honorable  
Justices of the County Court of Wash County in  
Open Court Patrick Linn aged sixty seven years  
on the last day of June 1820 resident in the  
County of Wash County which being first duly sworn  
under oath in his own behalf declared that he served  
in the Revolutionary War as follows to-wit In the  
5<sup>th</sup> Pennsylvania Regiment commanded by Col  
Ladson and in Capt Benjamin Beath's company  
and in the Pennsylvania line and the date  
of the original declaration handed in by me and signed was  
on the 18<sup>th</sup> day of March 1818. And the No of the Pension Certificate is 16122 And I do solemnly swear that I was a  
resident citizen of the United States on the 18<sup>th</sup> day of March  
1818 and that I have not since that time by gift  
sale or in any manner disposed of my property or  
any part thereof with intent thereby to diminish  
it or to bring myself within the provisions of an  
Act of Congress entitled an Act to provide for certain per-  
sons engaged in the Land and Naval Service of the  
United States in the Revolutionary War passed on the  
18<sup>th</sup> day of March 1818 and that I have not nor has  
any one in trust for me any property or Service  
tax debts contracts due to me nor have I any  
income other than what is contained in the  
Schedule herewith annexed and by me subscribed

My Occupation a farmer and I am unable to procure a living by my labors I have not any children living with me nor any other persons except my wife who is about 64 years old and unable to labor I went to before the County Court in open Court on the 10<sup>th</sup> day of July 1820

I William M Suckroth Clerk of the County Court of Bath do certify that the foregoing Petition and Schedule above entered are truly copied from the Record of said Court and I do further certify that it is the opinion of said Court that the total amount in value of the property exhibited in the above and Schedule is thirty nine dollars In Testimony whereof I the Clerk of said

said Court have hereunto set my hand and affixed the Seal of the ~~Said~~ of ~~the~~ ~~County~~ and County of Bath at Quincyville this 10<sup>th</sup> day of July 1820

of the Court of the County of said Bath County that  
at a Court held for Bath County on the 11<sup>th</sup> day of  
May 1818 Patrick O. Linn produced and made oath  
to the following Statement to wit "Patrick O. Linn is  
listed in the fourth Pennsylvania Regiment for one  
year was entered under Col Anthony Wayne at  
Sauttergo commanding the fourth Regiment of the  
Pennsylvania line and then entered for three years  
or during the War was taken prisoner and was  
a prisoner nine months & ten days was discharged  
at Trenton at the time the whole Pennsylvania line  
was discharged and your applicant was honorably dis-  
charged My first Captain was Capt Frazier second Capt  
Benjamin Bartholomew. Your applicant took his  
discharge at Liveston is now aged infirm & poor  
not possessing land home care hog or scarcely any  
thing else, and claim a pension under Act of Congress"  
And it appearing to the Satisfaction of the Court  
from evidence that said Patrick O. Linn was an en-  
listed Soldier as above stated and is in Indigent  
circumstances and stands in need of the assistance  
of Government for a Support All of which is Averred  
to be verified In Testimony whereof I the Clerk  
of said Bath County do hereby set my hand and  
affix the Seal of the said County of Bath  
at Owensville this 12<sup>th</sup> day of May 1818 in the  
26<sup>th</sup> year of the Commonwealth
