The Widows' Pension Law, passed by the Kentucky Legislature, provides for the widows of soldiers only, and they must have been residents of the State of Kentucky since January 1, 1907.

Widow must have married prior to 1890.

To be eligible the applicant must have remained a widow after the death of her soldier husband, and must be indigent. Read the questions in the application carefully and answer them fully.

Read the law, and unless you come clearly under the laws it will be useless to file application.

Sterling, Kentucky, and was released May 12, 1865, at Rock Island Barracks, Illinois, on taking the oath of allegiance to the United States.

Gentlemen:

Mrs. Elizabeth O'Banion, who was a pensioner under certificate 912, died on the 2nd Inst., an inmate at the time of her death of the Asylum for the Insane, at Lexington, Kentucky. It seems from records before me that she did not draw her pension during the time of her confinement in the insane asylum, and if such is the case I take it that the back pay would be due her estate, first for defraying of the expenses of her burial and secondly for distribution of the remainder among her heirs at law. Her oldest son, Clark O'Banion has duly qualified as administrator of her estate and I enclose herewith certified copy of the order of his appointment.

Please send to me such papers as may be necessary for the administrator to execute and I will deliver them to him and see that they are properly executed.
