I, Geo. W. Stacy Certify that I
am a citizen of Kentucky, resident at Court X Roads in the County of Lester
in said State of Kentucky, and was a soldier from the State of Kentucky, in the war between
the United States and the Confederate States and I do hereby apply for aid under the Act of the General Assembly of
Kentucky, entitled "An Act granting pension to disabled and indigent Confederate soldiers." And I do solemnly swear
that I was a member of Company "B" 10th Ky Mounted Inf.
in the service of the Confederate States, and that by reason of disability and indigence I am now entitled to receive the
benefit of this Act. I further swear that I do not receive aid or pension from any other State, or from the United States,
and that I am not an inmate of any soldier's home, and that I am unable to earn a reasonable support for myself and fam-
ily. I do further solemnly swear that the answers given to the following questions are true:

Resulting from Chronic Muscular Rheumatism. The shoulder is doing fast of the body and is not pronounced in the lumbar muscles and the right shoulder and muscle of the upper right arm. He has also an asthma of spasmodic nature but more pronounced at times by exertion. The bronchial asthma cough is almost constant. On consequence of the Rheumatism and the asthma he is unable to earn his living by manual labor.

The name George W. Stacy has not been found on the rolls, on file in this office, of any organization known as the 10th Kentucky, Confederate States Army.

The records show, however, that one G. B. Stacy, private, Company B, May's Battalion Kentucky Mounted Rifles, afterwards 10th (Diamond's) Kentucky Cavalry, Confederate States Army, enlisted February 6, 1863; that as G. Stacy, Company B, 10th Kentucky Cavalry, Confederate States Army, he was captured June 10, 1864, at Mt. Sterling, Kentucky; transferred from Rock Island, Illinois, for exchange March 13, 1865, and received for March 23, 1865, at Boulware's or Cox's Wharf, James River, by the agent of exchange. No later record of him has been found.
