## Crowd On Hand As Duke, Duchess Arrive At Miami

Hurry To Hospital For Inspection Of Wally's Bad Tooth; Applause Goes Up As Couple Appears On Deck Of Yacht; Planes Roar And Ships Set Off Din

MIAMI, Dec. 10.—The Duchess of Windsor, looking smart and chipper despite a seriously infected tooth, arrived in Miami today with her royal husband for a major dental operation.

The duke and his American-born duchess arrived aboard the yacht Southern Cross and went through the formalities of receiving dignitaries and talking with newsmen before they sped to St. Francis hospital for preliminary X-rays.

A crowd laxed police lines

and blocked traffic in Biscayne boulevard to get a glimpse of the royal couple as they left the same pier where President Roosevelt embarked a week before for a Caribbean cruise.

When the Windsors appeared on deck, a roar of applause rose from the crowd.

As the duke and duchess left the yacht, steamships in the harbor sounded their whistles and coast-guard planes roared a salute overhead.

The duchess appeared well and

in good spirits.

After the overnight stay at the hospital, the Windsors planned to retire to a hotel.

### Duchess' Dentist Is Local Man's Brother

The dental surgeon who was examining the Duchess of Windsor today at Miami preliminary to a probable operation is a brother of Lieutenant Lloyd Cartee of the New Boston police department.

He is Dr. Horace L. Cartee, a native of Carter, Ky., son of Mrs. George Cartee, who still resides at Carter.

The Miami dentist is an older brother of Lieutenant Cartee. He attended grade school at Carter, high school at Berea, Ky., and is a graduate of the University of Louisville dental college. After practicing three years at Earlington, in western Kentucky, he went to Miami, where he has been since 1926.

Dr. Cartee became acquainted with the Duke and Duchess of Windsor last October when he was called to their home at Nassau, where the former British king is governor of the Bahamas, for a tooth extraction. When the duchess needed treatment they called on Dr. Cartee.
