We, the undersigned, do this day, will our land and everything that we have, in fact, what we may get from the estate of kinfolks and friends or gather from any source. Whatever from now until our death or even what might come in after our death, we will it to our three last children, Harlan, Herman and Irene: Harlan and Herman is to have the land and Irene is to have \$200. Two Hundred dollars in cash if there is that much cash on hand. If not, it must be got out of property or some other way.

This is the consideration. They are to have these things for taking care of us while we live. The boys is to take care of us.

Irene is not to be out anything on us whatever. Her money is not due until we are both gone. The boys is to take care of Irene while she stays single, and this is to be her home until she marries: this land and what is contained in this will is not to be turned over to them until both of our deaths unless everything falls to the children just the same as if they was to die. And they are to get out of the house the same day they marry with nothing but their clothes. No one is to be brought into the home by us or the boys or even moved on the farm. No land is to be rented to anyone, no property is to be sold, after one of us is gone without the consent of the boys, Harlan and Herman.

Harlan and Herman is to divide the land themselves and neither one is to sell to anyone out to the other. In case one of the boys was to turn out bad and fail to help to take care of us, he is to be cut out of the benefit of this will. And if the other one is good, the good one is to have everything and he is to have nothing.
